Grinton Conservation Project: December update

Burn off those Christmas excesses with some 'outdoor gym'! Come and join our winter maintenance sessions, clearing brambles from the informal paths and graves. Secateurs and thorn-proof gloves will be useful.

Bats: For 2015, NYBG plan regular survey nights, 1st Wednesday each month from April - October. Bad weather may mean we swap to a different night - we'll publicise these on our Forum (see link below).

Bees: We'll complete one more varroa treatment in December, then we won't open the hive until the temperature warms up around April.

Trees: Quite a few trees have grown rapidly and are encroaching on graves. We've got a selection of photos from the past (early 20th century onwards) showing fewer, and much smaller trees. Many yew trees are swamping other trees and making graves inaccessible for family visits. We're drafting a plan to prune (and fell if necessary), and will discuss this with YDNPA to agree a program for the next few years.

Wildflowers & Paths: We've summarised Marjorie Daniels' species records from the last 2 summers, and over the winter will clear the brambles from the informal paths at the West end. We're planning wildflower 'I-Spy' over the summer - more info later.





Big Dig: End of Season Report

During the summer, householders and teams of enthusiasts dug 27 one-meter-square private and public land test pits on throughout Reeth. These excavations produced nearly 2,000 pieces of dating evidence, mostly in the form of pottery fragments but also glass, nails and even a medieval metal lock. Project leader Alan Mills, of the Swaledale and Arkengarthdale Archaeoloav Group (SWAAG) which organised and managed the project, reports on the first season's work of The Swaledale Big Dig:

The principle of digging multiple test pits throughout a single community is to see what dating patterns emerge from among the finds by assessing their composition and style, and taking into account the depth at which they are found. It's a method that is supported by professional archaeologists and that has produced remarkable results in other parts of the country.

While we already know that this general area of Swaledale has been more or less continuously inhabited since the Bronze Age, and we did recover one piece of Roman pottery in this project, the striking thing about this year's Big Dig finds is that within the built-up area of the village of Reeth we found no dating evidence older than pottery fragments from the late 1100s and the 1200s. It suggests that this was the time, beginning around the reigns of the first Plantagenet kings, Henry II and Richard I, when a thriving community became properly established. We found 52 pieces from this period, but only 21 dating from the 1300s to 1500s. which the professional archaeologists tell us is indicative of an economic decline.

That fits with the known history of Swaledale, which was devastated in the 1300s, first by Scottish armies, which for a period of 30 years came south to raid the wealthy Yorkshire monasteries. They often travelled the length of Swaledale on their way in and out of the county, and early

accounts talk of them rampaging throughout Richmondshire, destroying religious buildings, including Marrick and Ellerton Priories in Swaledale, and also burning villages and manors. Then in the second half of that century came the bubonic plague which is known to have depleted vastly the population of Yorkshire, just as it did in most of the rest of the country.

Our finds of more than 130 pieces of pottery from the 1600s indicate that this was the period in which Reeth was finally restored to vibrancy, leading to the royal grant of a market charter in 1695. This coincides with the known expansion of the lead-mining industry in the area, which drew more people to live and work in what was then a relatively stable environment. As you would expect the number of datable finds from the 1700s to the present day increased dramatically.


We feel satisfied that the Big Dig has already provided us with a great deal of useful information about the history of Reeth, and no doubt more will emerge as we obtain more specialist advice and guidance on the individual finds and on the indications they have for our understanding of the past.

Next year, which is the second and last year of the project, we will probably do more work in Reeth but our main focus will move to the neighbouring villages of Fremington and Grinton. Not only do we hope to learn more about them individually, but also to compare the findings from the three villages to see whether common patterns emerge that might help us to take a broader view on the history of the whole area. We have a number of locations lined up for test pits next year but we are still keen to hear from anyone else who would like to offer a patch of ground to be explored in Fremington and Grinton.

"The Great Nils Lofgren"

Bruce Springsteen's words, not mine; but to describe Nils Lofgren as one of the guitarists in Bruce Springsteen's E Street Band, would be to do him a grave injustice: he is a singer, songwriter and multi-instrumentalist in his own right who has fronted his own band and worked with many other musicians, notably Neil Young.

Nils started playing the classical accordion at the age of five and studied it seriously for 10 years before switching to guitar. In an interview for Radio Teesdale, I asked Nils what it was that turned him to the rock guitar. "Well, I blame The Beatles," he said. "I really fell in love with popular music through The Beatles and the flood gates opened thanks to The Beatles and just their more sophisticated melodies and chord structure really grabbed me as a classical musician and that was it. It was a great hobby for a couple of years - in Middle America nobody thought you could do it as a living - then when I was 16 in Washington DC I saw The Who and then we all ran over to see Jimi Hendrix on The Late Show with Pete Townsend and that night I was possessed with the notion of trying to be a rock musician so I hit the road at 17 and 46 years later here I am."

He was fortunate that Neil Young took him under his wing and when he was only 18, was asked to play on Young's album After The Goldrush - as a pianist. "Well, they said guitar, singing and piano and I questioned that and said 'I'm really not a professional piano player' but they had more faith in



me than I did and said they were confident I would figure out a few simple parts. I was blown away and never left the piano, practising day and night but I played some good simple parts on what turned out to be a very landmark beautiful record."

Nils had a "great time" following a musical career and "fell in love with performing which is by far the most fun thing of my job, When I know I have a show at night I'm just so excited to wake up and prepare physically, mentally, spiritually, musically and getting out and singing in front of An audience is like a second home to me."

Then Bruce Springsteen came along. "We had been friends for a long time," Nils explained, "I used to buy tickets and go see Bruce and The E Street Band regularly in the seventies and early eighties and I told him one day that I really enjoyed being in a great band and not being the boss every day of my life. So I think he filed it away and when he needed a guitarist I got a call. We jammed for two days with the band and he asked me to join - another landmark musical moment for me right up there with the After The Goldrush experience when I was eighteen. And

thirty years later hear I am and we've just been inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame "

The most poignant part of the interview was when Nils talked about his close friendship with band member. the late Clarence Clemons. "It was a devastating blow to everybody [when he passed away] and he was always so kind . . . so yes, a terrible loss. I didn't want Bruce to put anybody next to me playing sax, and he didn't, he got a five man horn section. There was nobody like Clarence, not just the brilliant sax playing but the camaraderie. I often remember just sitting on the riser in the dark whispering while Bruce would do something alone . . . from just talking about life and people and kids, to guessing what we were going to play next because Bruce would never follow the set list and we got pretty good at it. It was an honour to have him around and stand next to him for 27 years and I just wish it was a lot longer."

Nils has recently released a careerspanning 10 disc limited edition box set called Face The Music. "When I went hundreds back there were hundreds of recordings and I've handpicked my favourites. There's a 144 page booklet; my wife Amy was the artistic director and we have put a beautiful package together. It was a year and a half's work and we are very proud of it." Nils will be performing some of the songs on the box set when he tours England in January. He is appearing at The Sage, a venue he has visited before. "The audiences there fabulous have been and usually afterwards I try to get out and sign for an hour or so - anything you want -

and I'll encourage them to keep the pub open so people can have a chat. The best part of great rock and roll is getting out and singing for people and having a visit with them after." This will be Nils' first solo tour of the UK for over three years and he says, "I am very inspired and excited about it. We are planning on doing a great show for everybody in every town."

Post Office News

Beware the scammers!

You often hear about people who have been scammed out of sometimes thousands of pounds—and it is very easy to think: 'It won't happen to me.' However over the past few months we have had four customers in the post office requesting to send a moneygram overseas. This is an instant money transfer that cannot be reversed. Whilst a moneygram is a legitimate, secure way to send money abroad, if someone contacts you out of the blue and requests you to carry out a transfer on their behalf, chances are that it is a scam

In the cases we know about, the contacted have been different ways, perhaps over the phone, via their computer or even by letter. The people carrying out the are very persuasive scams extremely clever in the ways they convince people to part with their money. And if they think they have 'hooked a victim' they will be relentless in their attempts to get their money, often requesting increasingly large sums of money.

We do our utmost to handle these situations sensitively and will not carry out a transaction if we suspect it is a scam. But the age old advice still applies: if it sounds too good to be true, it is. (See advice on next page.)

And finally, on a more positive note: Don't forget that we can process Home Shopping Returns at the shop till when the Post Office is closed; and if shopping online, some companies (for example Amazon) will let you have items delivered to the Post Office.

Avoiding Telephone Scams

Figures published last month by Financial Fraud Action UK (FFA UK) show a significant rise in the number of consumers who have been targeted by phone scammers over the last year. In response they have issued advice to consumers on how to take steps to avoid this type of scam:

Be wary of:

- Unsolicited approaches by phone.
- Cold callers who suggest you hang up the phone and call them back. Fraudsters can keep your phone line open by not putting down the receiver at their end.

Your bank or the police will never:

- Phone you to ask for your 4 digit card PIN or your online banking password, even by tapping them into the telephone keypad.
- Ask you to withdraw money to hand over to them for safekeeping.
- Ask you to transfer money to a new account for fraud reasons, even if they say it is in your name.
- Send someone to your home to collect your cash, PIN, payment card or cheque book if you are a victim of fraud.
- Ask you to purchase goods using your card and then hand them over for safe-keeping.

Never disclose your:

 Four digit card PIN to anyone, including the bank or police.

- Your password or online banking codes
- Personal details unless you are sure who you are talking to.

Remember

It takes two people to terminate a call. If you feel something is suspicious or feel vulnerable, hang up, wait five minutes to clear the line, or where possible use a different phone line, then call your bank or card issuer on their advertised number to report the fraud.

If you don't have another telephone to use, call someone you know first to make sure the telephone line is free.

Your bank will also never ask you to check the number showing on your telephone display matches their registered telephone number. The display cannot be trusted, as the number showing can be altered by the caller.

Criminals may already have basic information about you in their possession (e.g. name, address, account details), so do not assume a caller is genuine because they have these details or because they claim to represent a legitimate organisation.

Nowt's same ... Or is it?

In 1965 tourism was in its infancy in Swaledale. Visitors would stay at B&Bs, one of the hotels or at a youth hostel. The proliferation of holiday cottages and Bunk Barns was yet to come.

When two cottages we owned (which were on life tenancies with a combined yearly rental of £47) became available in 1964, we decided to renovate, furnish them and let them to visitors. This was an innovative and exciting idea and we believe we were the first in this area. Little did we know it would become a life style and we would still be in business 50 years later!

How things have changed over those years. Or have they?

All enquiries were by phone or letter. Payment was by cheque. Advertising was via the Dalesman. Paper work was run off on a Gestetner machine. You typed onto a wax A4 sheet which was put onto the inked machine and copies produced by turning a handle. The season was Easter to October; no bookings of less than a week, no winter lets at all. Always fully booked we had a waiting list for cancellations. As visitors left they reserved the same week for the following year. The price for one week was £12. Four weeks booked and we had achieved the same income as long letting for a year.

Today most enquiries are via email. Online direct bank transfer has been added to the use of cheques. Advertising has become more of a necessity and the Dalesman has been augmented with other magazines. The advent of large agencies has made a good website essential if you choose to 'go it alone'. A presence on Social media helps to 'spread the word' and good reviews all help. Administrative work has been made easier (or harder) as computers have become more widely available. Our first computer in 1981 was a Commodore Pet for which you wrote your own programs in Basic. Today we have an i mac, laptop, smart phone and laser printer. Booking and attracting new visitors is far more costly and complicated. Cottages are open all year with short breaks being offered. Supply has exceeded demand and many villages have more cottages available for holiday letting than for permanent residency.

Visitors' expectations have altered and cottages are more like mini hotels with welcome packs and toiletries. Cooker and a basic fridge have expanded to include separate freezer, fridge, washing machine, microwave, dishwasher, flat screen Television, CD players, cycle storage and internet access. All furnishings, crockery, kitchen utensils are coordinated with frequent updating.

A lot has changed but much remains the same, an annual inspection by the tourist board and the fact that satisfied visitors and personal recommendation are more important than any advertising. How grateful we are to our loyal regulars, many coming for over 20 years and one couple for over 40 years. So many have become family friends and it is sad when they can no longer make the journey.

We had few restrictions in the early days. About our fourth let, a visitor turned up with three black labradors. We gulped and requested they stayed downstairs. We spent the changeover day removing black hairs from our lovely new golden wool blankets.

Another visitor complained because their dog was too fat to get through the stiles and there were sheep in the fields. (Well, this is Swaledale.)

We hand-built our present properties on our site in the 1980s and decided no pets at all and aim for an allergy free zone. After some very responsible regular visitors had gone home we found all these hairs on the lounge suite. We were amazed. We then discovered they had purchased local Swaledale sweaters! Would we have to ban those?

It has been a life commitment. Would we do it again? Yes, our regulars will not allow us to retire and now Dave (son) is on hand to do the maintenance we can sit down - occasionally.

Proposed Library Reorganisation

People across North Yorkshire are being asked to give their views on proposals for a major expansion of community involvement in the county's library service.

By 2020, the County Council will have seen its library budget fall dramatically from around £7.8m in 2010 to an expected £4.2m for 2019-20. The reduction is part of a cut of some £167m to the council's overall spending.

A three-month county-wide consultation on the proposals began on 3 November. It's hoped that as many people as possible will take part in a constructive examination of the suggestions put forward for meeting the latest budgetary restraints while continuing to provide an effective and valued service. The council would continue to provide a Home Library Service for people who have difficulty reaching a library, and a Supermobile service.

The library service would continue to support outlets such as the Hudson House library in Reeth and local collections in pubs and village halls.

"Libraries are community assets and with the enormous financial pressures the County Council is under, we need to appeal to the communities themselves to help keep as many libraries as possible open and available to all those who use them," commented Councillor Chris Metcalfe.



Arkengarthdale School News

It's been an incredibly busy, yet immensely rewarding, couple of months Arkengarthdale School, with so many proud moments to share with you. As part of our World War 1 week, the children, staff and parents created a stunning and poignant piece of artwork that featured more than 1,000 hand-made poppies. The stunning display, inspired by the sea of poppies at the Tower of London not only proved popular with residents and visitors to the Dale, but also led to over £600 being raised to support injured, wounded and sick soldiers and veterans. Help For Heroes northern Recovery Centre Phoenix House Recovery Centre, in Catterick, was chosen as the charity to benefit from the School's project and the KS2 children were delighted to have the opportunity of visiting the Centre. They enjoyed a tour of the facility and were proud to donate the cheque from their fundraising activities. Comments Eoghan, a year 3 pupil at Arkengarthdale School on his visit to Phoenix House Recovery Centre, "It was interesting and funny seeing Mrs Brown on one of the bicycles that the injured

soldiers use in the gym! We were able to see where people recover and how the money we donated can help them." The money was raised from a number of activities. As well as selling poppies the children hosted a World War 1 open afternoon, where they sang songs such as 'It's a long way to Tipperary', read war poems and served delicious refreshments to the audience.

Our World War 1 project has received overwhelming support from the community and what started out to be a small contribution by a small school has developed into something we could not have imagined when we embarked on our acknowledgement to those who lost their lives in the war. As a result of our Poppy display, we have in fact reached out to a much wider audience than we had ever anticipated. The week also involved the children taking part in a remembrance service at Arkengarthdale Church, kindly led by Rev Caroline Hewlett, on 11th November to commemorate the centenary, as well as learning about life as a serving solider in World War 1, from local war expert Chris Best, plus creating displays from their own research and writing letters based on what they have learnt about life on the frontline. The children also remembered



the five men from Arkengarthdale killed in World War 1. Mrs Brown (KS2 teacher) Graham White (governor) and Thomas Barningham (Y6 pupil) were also in the media spotlight, being interviewed on BBC Radio York.

Our six Year 6 pupils enjoyed a fabulous week at East Barnby, the outdoor pursuits centre near Whitby with their friends from the Methodist School in Richmond. They enjoyed activities including shelter-building, beck-scrambling, rock-climbing, orienteering, fossil-hunting, sea-shore study and canoeing. A year 6 pupil said, "It was an amazing experience, we all had a fantastic time especially when Mr Allison and Mrs Brown did the Looney Leap!"

Our team of Eco Warriors visited a workshop at Harlow Carr Gardens, Bramall Learning Centre, where they took part in activities informing them about energy saving in school, global environment, team building and a tour of the Eco building. seeing first-hand how recycled products are used and ideas to save energy. They were inspired to bring energy/eco saving ideas to school and encourage us all to be as eco friendly as we can. They are now drawing up an action plan to begin their improvements. Ryan, Amy, Gideon, Izzy, Hannah and Eoghan agreed that "it was a fun morning, which has informed us to achieve the bronze flag for our school. It was a shame we couldn't have stayed all day!"

The year 6 pupils visited RAF Leeming for the 'Crucial Crew' project, which is a day of hands-on safety activities where the children have the chance to experience potentially dangerous situations in safe and supervised environments. Comments Amy Atkinson, "It inspired me to go home and practice the recovery position on my Mum! It's given me more confidence if I had to deal with an emergency situation."

On the performing arts front I have been amazed at how the children have embraced music, singing and drama. The choir's outstanding performance in the Snowman production deserves a mention.

The children, joined by pupils from Richmond Methodist School, sang alongside the Richmondshire Orchestra for a very moving rendition of the Snowman. Only a few days later, all the school children took part in our Christmas play. As part of our WW1 studies, the children produced their own letters and diary entries, which depict what life would have been like in the trenches. Along with carols and readings the children re-told the story of the Christmas Truce. Thank you to everyone who supported the play and especially to the church wardens for allowing us to use St Mary's Church as venue and the Friends Arkengarthdale School for providing refreshments.

Our Thursday night sports club has continued well into the winter and culminated in a hard-fought football match against our friends and neighbours from Reeth and Gunnerside School. The match was completed in torrential rain and near darkness with the result of 4-1 to Arkengarthdale being secondary to the excellent spirit in which the game was played.

So the end of 2014 was packed full of great work by the children. We are already looking forward to our projects for 2015.
