

The roads were much quieter then and the shops not geared up for tourists. We could not buy a loaf of bread in the Dale - all the bread was ordered. So we bought flour and yeast and made our own. The oven in the cottage had three settings: high, medium and low. Nevertheless, the bread was a real treat.

The following year we moved to Havermill Cottage at Crackpot and then up to Jenny Sunter's Robson House Cottage on Whitaside. Our first holiday

at Robson Cottage cost the princely sum of £7.00 - what a bargain. We returned for many years, eventually bringing our own children.

During our 1969 holiday I was a 20 year old student and with my then fiancé, we came across Old Gang Lead Mine. It really was quite amazing - like an open-air museum, tools scattered everywhere with larger pieces equipment in various stages dereliction. At that time. I was training to teach in Durham and decided to write my dissertation on Lead Mining in Swaledale. I had the privilege of chatting to Mr John Tom Rutter, who was one of the last lead miners, at his home in Gunnerside. (I think.)

Fracking in Swaledale

Fracking is the process of drilling down into the earth before a high-pressure water mixture is directed at the rock to release the gas inside. Water, sand and chemicals are injected into the rock at high pressure which allows the gas to flow out to the head of the well.

The largest expanses of shale rock are situated in the countryside, and this is where the majority of economically viable sites are likely to be.

There are many arguments for and against fracking and no doubt in the run up to the General Election, they will get plenty of air time. In the meantime however, a number of companies are applying for exploration licences. One such company is The Yorkshire Dales Energy Exploration Company (YDEEC) which is looking into the possibilities of fracking in the National Park.

What you might have thought were roadworks may well have been YDEEC. They have been digging holes in various locations to obtain core samples of the target rock formation as well as conducting seismic surveys. The information from the exploratory drilling and seismic surveys will give them an idea of how much oil or gas can be extracted.

Although it is early days yet, their geological surveys indicate that Swaledale may be an excellent place for gas extraction. Whilst YDEEC may not have the resources necessary to take the project into production, the exploration allows them to gather the data needed to attract large investors. 

You are then confronted with a webpage which seems to have loads of download buttons and flashing messages saying, "Your computer is running slowly!" or, "Speed up your internet connection!" or, "Your computer is infected!"

If you see anything like this STOP. Don't click anything - you are more than likely on a scam download site. Click the browser back button to get back to the google results page.

What you should do is look at the website address google is taking you to. Almost certainly it is unlikely to be first in the list. The scammers are good at getting their result high up the

list. Look instead for the website that the program writers use (eg. If it is Adobe Flash check you are going to adobe.com and not download.com.)

Why do they do this? Simple: money. Every time you download and install rubbish they get paid by the rubbish writers.

It gets worse. Even legitimate websites now bundle other stuff, eg Adobe often offers toolbars or McAfee Security Scan as 'value added'. Make sure you read the page carefully before you click that button.

Whenever you are following an installation screen it is tempting to accept the standard or quick install. Never do this. Always choose custom install. Read each page carefully and make sure only the things you want are installed.



Upper Dales Family History Group

For our February meeting, instead of having a guest speaker, we worked in small groups on problem solving, looking at some of the commonest brick walls encountered in family history research and sharing possible ways to tackle them before pooling our findings over a cup of tea.

the problems Many of which cropped up were common to most of the groups. Everyone had come across the difficulty of several people in a parish having the same name and of names being repeated across several generations in one family. There were members also cases of family 'disappearing' in between censuses with no apparent date of death or changing their personal information on every census, as well as the frustrations caused by 'running out of records'.

We discussed a number of ways to tackle the difficulties including some lesser known sources of information such as wills, land transactions and nonconformist records as well as newspapers and magazines, many of which can now be searched online, before finishing with a quiz to recap some of the sources we'd covered.

The next meeting is at Harmby Village Hall near Leyburn at 2.00pm on Wednesday, April 22nd. The speaker will be Dr David Severs on 'Hugh Pannell, an 18th century North Riding clockmaker.' Since retiring as Chief Constable of North Yorkshire, David has studied history at York University and has developed a particular interest in local clockmakers, including his own

ancestors. He has written three books on the subject and recently hosted a major exhibition at Tennant's in Leyburn bringing together antique clocks from all over the country.

Putting Things into Perspective

Not so prominent in the news any longer is the impact on Lebanon and the plight of refugees from Syria, thousands of whom who have left their destroyed villages and cities during the on-going conflict. I thought readers might be interested in knowing more about their predicament.

I was in Lebanon recently to do with a Quaker school there for which I am a Trustee. I had the opportunity of visiting two schools in the Bekaa valley where thousands of refugees are confined in tent camps in icy conditions. My friend who took me there works for a charity which organises three schools operating under the harshest physical conditions. The first camp we visited

was surrounded by a wire fence and we entered through piles of snow, which had been cleared to make a small playing space for the 300 pupils who attend the school. The outside of the tents, which are basically canvas and polythene sheets stretched over wooden frames, are cheerfully decorated with colourful pictures.

We entered a dark narrow passage between the tented classrooms in which the children are cramped in makeshift desks. The spaces were not too cold as small oil stoves were bubbling in the corner and there are no windows, although there was some ventilation through a sagging roof in one class where the recent snow storms had made it collapse. In another class a hole in the wall was presumed to have been caused by the weather.

The children, thanks to various charities, are fairly well dressed, and were responding to their young Syrian teachers with enthusiasm. Each day they come in two shifts and have classes in Arabic, Maths and English, as well as activities outside where we witnessed a teacher playing ball games

with a group and telling them stories however compassionate they feel for emphasised the values which cooperation and tolerance. What were understanding, these poor kids wonder?

There are children there suffering from severe trauma who hide when they hear a plane, or who have lost parents and are shepherded around by a caring sibling. We were proudly shown a dilapidated bookcase in the corner of an empty room. It had been donated by a University in Beirut and was piled high with given school books. How out of date they were I don't know.

We called on a neighbouring family where my friend had something to discuss about a child. There were two tents joined together. Five family adults and about fifteen children were huddling around a little stove on rugs and blankets. I was offered a white plastic chair to sit on. Two of these seemed to be the only furniture and both had holes in the seats so I had to perch on the edge. There was an alcove with pots and pans and some piped water in a basin, where the ablutions of all twenty inhabitants took place as well as food preparation.

The toilets were shared cabins in the alleyways, which I gathered caused health hazards during the summer as well as a serious stench

Various health checks were offered through the school by some charities; and basic food as well as free bread was obtainable. The families were eager to find work and the household we visited depended on one man who was a tailor

For the Lebanese, the situation poses a huge problem. About a third of the population are refugees,

the plight of their neighbours, they fear for the undercutting of their jobs when lower wages are accepted and that the conflict will spread - as it already has on the borders. The whole political scene remains precarious and has thrown Lebanon yet again into economic crisis.

What future these people have one cannot tell. Will they ever return to their devastated homes? Is their future to be like those Palestinians who still live in camps in the country after fleeing their homes sixty years ago?

Despite all this, we saw nothing but smiling faces, grateful that they are not forgotten and for the help that charities and NGOs provide. It was a humbling sight.

Scott Trial Treasurer Richard Hague then presented the cheques to around 30 organisations including: Swaledale Scouts, Swaledale Mountain Rescue, Reeth & Gunnerside Primary Schools, Arkengarthdale Primary School, Yorkshire Air Ambulance, Great North Air Ambulance, Reeth YFC, Swaledale Seedlings Playgroup, Friends of the 2 Dales Nursery, Swaledale & Arkengarthdale Luncheon Club and

Marrick Parish Council for Marrick Institute Fund.

Nigel Mackenzie, Manager for the 2014 Centenary Scott Relay Team, presented cheques for more than £4,000 raised by their team, to the Yorkshire Air Ambulance and Great North Air Ambulance. Three times World Champion Yrjo Vesterinen, Trevor Willans, Joe Buckworth, Glen Scholey, Mark Willis and Carl Tennent, some of whom were multiple award winners in the event from the 1970s until more recently, completed the trial as a relay team in just over seven hours.

At the end of the evening, Chris Wallis retiring Scott Trial Secretary was presented with a Neil Sturgeon framed photograph of Orgate Falls, one of her favourite sections, in recognition of her work and dedication to the Scott Trial over the last 7 years.



Notes from your District Councilor

By the time you are reading this, Spring will be well under way with nothing but sunny days ahead and the snow and ice nothing but a distant memory.

Amongst the issues that people are concerned about and have asked me to look into are two items that are important to our safety and wellbeing in the Dales.

Firstly, the provision of Out of Hours G P Services: Dr Brookes kindly explained to me that to access medical help during surgery hours (Mon to Fri 0800 to 1800) then contact the practice directly. At all other times telephone 111. They will either advise you to contact the practice next time it is open, contact the Out of Hours GP who will contact you directly, or they will dispatch an ambulance to you. If you are asked to go to the out of hours centre they will arrange a suitable time. Do not just turn up without an appointment, the Doctor may be out on a visit. Always ring 111 first.

The OOH centre is based at Harewood Medical Practice, Catterick Garrison on the Richmond Road, opposite McDonalds (Tesco's). It is your responsibility to get there.

Secondly, speeding on the roads around our Two Dales: The road from Arkengarthdale, particularly the section from the cattle grid into Reeth where there is no footpath has been brought to my attention. Our local police have been made aware. NYCC has a link on their website giving residents an opportunity to raise the issue.

www.northyorks.gov.uk then follow the links, residents / transport and safety / road safety / speed concerns.

Several local organisations have been awarded money or are in the process of applying for money from the Community Opportunities Fund. The money helps to maintain and develop the services which we rely on so much in our rural communities. If you require more information then please contact me.

In my last note I expressed thanks to the many people who assist with living in the Dales. I neglected to mention the staff at Reeth Garage who pointed out my mistake the next time I saw them. Please accept my apologies.

Finally, don't forget to use your vote on May 7th. All the Polling Stations for the Ward of Reeth & Arkengarthdale remain the same with the exception of Arkengarthdale, which will now be in St. Mary's Church from now on.

He Might Have Survived If...

Children in Years 5 and 6 at Reeth and Gunnerside Schools have been learning about the adventures of Captain Scott and his perilous expedition to the South Pole.

Taking on the role of journalists, they had the unique opportunity of meeting Captain Scott himself as he made an extra special trip to Reeth School. Following a long and informative interview, their main findings follow:

Captain Scott, the Antarctic explorer died a sad death on the frozen plains of Antarctica when he could have been saved. If his team mates had obeyed orders that he sent back frequently, Captain Scott might have survived.

The last message he sent back was when he was about to split off from his team and head out to the South Pole with his chosen four men. That message said to send a dog team out past the food depot to retrieve them and bring them back to safety. Unfortunately his team disobeyed that order and only sent the dogs as far as the food depot so Captain Scott and his two remaining men had to fight their way through the





blizzard trying to save their own lives.

They were never seen again, until, the youngest member of Scott's team, Apsley Cherry Garrard, found them in their tent dead. He was devastated.

So is Captain Falcon Scott really to blame for his own death and that of his small team or is it his team who were left at base camp? Kathleen Scott said: "When we heard about his tragic death me and Peter were speechless. We were overwhelmed. Life won't be the same without him."



Reeth Medical Centre News

The practice is hoping that the Tour legacy will inspire others into improving their health and environment through cycling micro-generation schemes in a new business venture, the first of its kind for the NHS.

As you know, we are frequently hit by power cuts during the winter months, which have a double effect of causing a lack of productivity in the staff unable to use IT equipment and also a lack of heating in the building. I brought in an old exercise bicycle and wired it to an alternator a few years ago. During a power cut, staff took in turns to pedal and power the surgery. It also kept them warm.

The impromptu generator system proved a hit, and it wasn't long before each workstation was equipped with a mini-cycle under each desk linked to a central battery supply. Staff pedal almost continuously to keep the lights on and the computers going.

This micro generation scheme is a win-win. We save a fortune on oil costs for heating as well as our electricity. We have a reliable and constant source of energy, provided we keep the staff topped up with hob-nobs and tea and we were able to capitalise on a great feed in tariff. We are also investing in the long term health benefits and welfare of our staff, many of whom have shed several stones in weight since starting here.

Some of the staff at the practice will easily cover the same distance as one of the stages of the Tour during a morning surgery from the comfort of

their desk. In fact there is a slight feeling of disappointment that the Bradley Wiggins of this world are having it easy. 'I would like to see him complete an end of month return whilst simultaneously tackling the Butter Tubs and arranging hospital transport,' one employee told me.

Of course there is the usual talk of staff exploitation, and the unions were unhappy when our pay clerk collapsed with exhaustion after working overtime, but really this is all just to be expected with any new project. We are currently applying for a patent for our scheme and hope to roll it out across the wider NHS from 1st April this year. Mike Brookes and the Team

What Could Reeth Methodist Church Do for You?

Following the public meeting held on a wintery evening, by candlelight, in Reeth Chapel, during a power cut, the following points were discussed:

The chapel is both a listed building and heritage site which restricts what can be done but these problems can also be seen as an opportunity to move forward in a positive manner. There is a belief that there is interest in the village as to what happens, be it through heritage or nostalgia.

Reeth Methodist Chapel was founded in the 1760s, by the local community for the local community resulting in a sense of identity with the building. Unfortunately it now holds a great deal of unrealised potential because fundamentally there are not enough folk from the community using the building on a day to day basis. It is used for elections, support groups, funerals and Swaledale Festival events. but the number of these events does not cover the upkeep of the building.

If more groups were to become involved, more folk would gain a stake in the chapel and a development would gain a momentum of its own.

Suggestions already made include: Reeth Parish Council using the building throughout the year, turning the building into a nursing home for locals and the revival of concerts such as Last Night of the Proms, previously held in Arkenaarthdale Chapel.

Are you involved with a group or organisation which could benefit from the use of the chapel, at a very

reasonable rate, then please come and see us. Come to the "Drop In" on a Friday morning; an open house coffee morning, no set charge, we just ask for a small donation to funds if you wish, or you might like to take a turn on the Friday rota running a Drop In morning.

The YDNPA require that a positive, meaningful effort is made to maintain/retain the building as a community asset. If we are to fulfil this obligation what project should we embark upon to provide a resource for the wider population?

We ask for your help. Do you have a suggestion, could you help organise a project, find funding or suggest/introduce us to someone else who could support such a project that would be for the good and well being of the whole community? You could help us in the first instance by completing our questionnaire, for which we would be very grateful. Questionnaires can be found in Chapel, shops around the village and in Hudson House. Completed questionnaires should be left at the Post Office or in the box in the Chapel porch by the 30th April '15.

It was a bit of a blow when the Council told us that after 15 April it will no longer fund the Friday trip that the District Reeth and Community vellow Transport bus runs from Arkengarthdale and Reeth to Leyburn. And an even bigger blow to those up and down the two dales who rely on this free bus service so they can do their weekly shop in Leyburn.

Until this decision to stop the funding, the Council paid R&DCT for running this trip. This covered the cost of the fuel and other expenses for the bus. As all the drivers are volunteers they give their time and effort for nothing.

So the team that runs the yellow bus decided that action must be taken - we can't let our passengers down, even if the Council won't help. We will continue to run the Friday "shopping" trip to Leyburn but after 15 April we will need to make a modest (and subsidised) charge - just £4 per person for a return trip.

Astronomy in the Two Dales

This month on the 16th to the 26th of April we

have the Lyrid meteor shower. At their peak on the 22nd of April as many as 30 meteors an hour may be seen streaking out from a point in the north eastern sky. There have been fantastic displays in the past - the best in 1803, when there were 700 meteors seen every hour. Below is a diagram of the constellation Lyra indicating where the meteors will appear. For the best view wrap up warm and lie down on a rug or a sun-lounger away from artificial light and look steadily up high in the sky. (You don't have to look directly at Lyra.)



The Lyrid meteor shower is among the oldest of known meteor showers, for which records go back 2,700 years. It is the result of the Earth passing through the dust left by a comet. By an irony of history the comet concerned is comet Thatcher - whose long tail the Earth will pass through just a fortnight before the general election.

April is a sparse month for planets. We still have Jupiter in the evening sky, but for those of us who are out and about at one o'clock in the morning, the planet Saturn may be seen to rise in the east as Jupiter is setting in the west. If you have binoculars or a bird watching telescope you may be able to make out the rings of Saturn. The test for those with telescopes is if you can discern the gap in the rings called the Cassini division, which was discovered in 1675 by Giovanni Cassini at the Paris Observatory.

Stay Safe: Never look directly at the sun, and never look in its direction when using binoculars or telescopes. If going out after dark, wrap up warm and make sure someone knows where you are.
