Here's what they have to say:

8.6%, that's less than 1 in 10, are the chances of surviving a heart attack outside hospital. That figure doubles to 20% if Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) is given immediately. When the heart has stopped beating CPR 'squeezes' the heart so it can pump oxygen rich blood around the body feeding vital organs would otherwise start deteriorate causing, for example, brain and kidney damage before ultimately resulting in death. If defibrillation is delivered promptly, survival rates as high as 75% have been reported.

The role of the Community First Responder (CFR) is to provide basic life support, early defibrillation and oxygen therapy; and to monitor and reassure patients prior to the arrival of the providing ambulance as well αs assistance to the attending ambulance crew. This is why chest pain and breathing difficulties are treated seriously as they are the main indicators to a possible heart attack.

In addition to heart attack CFRs also attend other life threatening medical emergencies including:

- Allergic reactions (anaphylaxis)
- Breathing problems
- Respiratory arrest
- · Chest pains
- Choking
- Convulsions/fitting

- Diabetic emergencies
- Heart problems (angina)
- Stroke
- Unconscious patients

Reeth and Grinton Community First Responders are local people serving local communities. We receive training 4 times a year, including recertification every 6 months, by the Community Defibrillation trainer for Yorkshire Ambulance Service NHS Trust. This vital training is held in the Reeth Memorial Hall and understandably incurs a cost. We receive a tremendous amount of support from the Yorkshire Ambulance Service, however, we do not receive any funding and are responsible for our own fundraising. We are, therefore, most grateful to be chosen by the Reeth Gazette Community Chest for this donation.



#### A Youth Club in Reeth?

Richie Bastow, a Youth Development Worker for Richmondshire and Hambleton, North Yorkshire Youth, recently attended the Parish Council meeting in Reeth to discuss Youth provision in Reeth and district. He is interested in finding out if there is a need for a youth club in Reeth and if one would be a viable proposition.

There are two main requisites for a youth club to be re-established in Reeth: people to run it and young people to attend. Ideally the person in charge (who would receive payment for fulfilling the role) would be a local person but if there was no-one willing to take responsibility, he would look further afield. In addition, voluntary helpers would be required.

Funding is available from various sources and Richie is able to offer help in applying for these.

If you have any thoughts on the need for a youth club, whether as a parent or a prospective member, Richie would like to hear your views. Also, if you are interested in being the paid organiser, or just helping out as a volunteer, he would like you to get in touch with him. His contact details are below.

Obviously this is still very much at the 'thinking about it' stage, but if there is a need - and without feedback from the community this is difficult to establish - Richie is keen to get something established as soon as possible.

As some locals will have noticed the National Park Rangers and Volunteers have been busy again by the river. The route beyond the Swing Bridge on the northern bank had become narrow, uneven and not a pleasant walk for some. You may have even been avoiding it.

Well now the route is vastly improved with an extended section of boardwalk, giving a long stretch of level footpath right by the river. The route to Healaugh has never looked so good.

What you may be interested to know is that a good portion of the cost of this work - mainly to cover materials - came from donations we received from the organisers of a few events held in Swaledale over the summer. These events included The Dales Trail Series, organised by Rich Gale of Swaledale Outdoors and his team; The OMM Bike & Lite, a mountain marathon event and the 'ArdRock Enduro mountain bike

event, based at the Dales Bike Centre. You may or may not have noticed these events taking place in Swaledale but one thing they have in common is that they all come here to take advantage of the stunning location and the challenges it provides for their competitors.



## Computer Corner

With Carol Haynes of Dales Computer Services

## Let's start the year with a spring clean

Happy New Year to everyone and I do hope your Christmas was an enjoyable break. Let's start off the New Year with a bit of a spring clean for your computer, tablet or phone.

The most useful tool I have found for clearing out rubbish is *CC*leaner. You can download the free version from these links:

For Windows: http://tinyurl.com/ ccleaner-windows (Note: it says TINYURL)

For Mac: http://tinyurl.com/ccleanermacos (the free version is fine)

Do copy the addresses carefully into the address bar of your browser (not a search box).

Once downloaded you need to install the programme. To do this, find the file you downloaded and double click on it and follow the instructions.

A CCleaner icon will be added to your desktop. Make sure all windows and programmes are closed and then double click the icon to start the programme.

When the window opens just click "Run Cleaner" and confirm you want to delete files. The default settings of the programme are safe - don't change any of them unless you know what you are doing.

Note that this only removes accumulated rubbish. It does not delete your files or photos etc. and it does not uninstall programmes. It does remove

cookies from your computer which means you will need to log in to websites again when you next visit them

There is a version for Android tablets too which you can download via GooglePlay app store for free; but as far as I know there is no version for Apple mobile devices.

CCleaner is updated fairly regularly and the company who make it take the opportunity to suggest buying the paid for version. If you find the programme helpful it is probably worth supporting them as they rely on sales to continue development of their products. There is no need to buy anything if you don't want to as there is always a free version to download.

Something else you can do is to uninstall programmes you no longer want or use. You can use the normal method for uninstalling programmes for your device. On Windows CCleaner has quick access to uninstalling programme: open CCleaner; click on 'Tools' on the left and then 'Uninstall' in the left column. Then click on the programme you want to remove and click 'uninstall' and follow the instructions.

Take care not to uninstall things you are not sure about. A good guide to what can and can't be removed is the date it was installed. If it was installed with the new computer or a long time ago leave it alone but if it is something recent you don't need it is likely safe to remove it if you don't need/use it.

## Astronomy in the Two Dales

Happy New Year and welcome to 2016. We start the year on the 3rd with the Quadrantids Meteor Shower. This display can rival that seen in December, however it is renowned for being a swift and sudden downpour and rarely lasts more than a few hours.

Its name is a bit confusing as the meteors are seen radiating from the constellation Bootes, the ploughman, so they should be called the Bootids. However they are named after a defunct constellation created in 1795 by the French astronomer Jerome Lalande: the Quadrans Muralis. They are best seen in the early morning, however the 2nd quarter moon will be bright enough to obscure some but not all, so look eastward before dawn.

The planets are still residing in the early morning southern sky, forming a line of Saturn, Venus, Mars and Jupiter. The best time for viewing this is 6.30am onwards, and on the 9th Saturn will be eclipsed by Venus. This event will occur over 8th, 9th and 10th of January, with the two planets getting ever nearer until they are seen as one. This event will occur low in the sky so a higher vantage point may be necessary.

The moon will also get in on the act, and as the new moon occurs on the 10th, there will be dark skies free of moon light for our planetary display, until the 24th when the full moon, known as the Full Wolf Moon by those with hairy knuckles, howls down at us.

#### Deep Sky Objects

As a New Year Bonus, we have been given extra space so that we can give the vast numbers of you who pour over the pages of this most excellent magazine some more detailed astronomical information.

When we look up at the night sky, we assume that what we are looking at are stars, burning suns, not dissimilar to our own star, albeit further away or a different colour. However there are a multitude of objects that, appearing to give off light, are not stars at all, and these are known as deep sky objects by astronomers.

These objects fall into several categories, and are best illustrated with images, so over the page are some pictures taken by members of the Reeth Informal Astronomy Group.

#### **Deep Sky Objects**

We shall start with galaxies. Here we have Bodes galaxy and the Andromeda galaxy.





These are similar to our own milky way galaxy in that they are chock full of stars, so many in fact that the stars themselves look like grains of dust. These objects are just visible to the naked eye and through binoculars they will show up as fuzzy blobs, however even with a powerful telescope, you would not see images as clear as these pictures, as these are made up of several photographic images layered one on top of the other. | all packed together, and at present

This allows the faint details to be brought out using computer image enhancement.

Then we have globular clusters. Here we have two globular clusters





M13 and M79

They have the designation M for Charles Messier (26 June 1730 - 12 April 1817) who was looking for comets and found a variety of bizarre things that were not, so he catalogued them and this became the Messier catalogue. blobby looking things are composed of hundreds of thousands of stars

defy all scientific explanation.

Finally we have the beauties of the universe, the nebula. The Orion Nebula and the Dumbell Nebula.





Nebula are the remains of an

exploded star and what we see in these pictures are the gas and dust left over from the massive detonation of a solar body, and yet in all this destruction, new stars can be seen forming in the dust clouds that will one day disperse until another nearby star reaches the end of its life and scatters its remains across the cosmos.

And where would we be without a photograph of our home, the Milky Way? The image at the bottom of the page shows dark patterns of dust through which no light can pass; the bright part is the centre of our galaxy, where the greatest concentration of stars is found.

## Upper Dales Family History Group

Sam Woods was the speaker at our last meeting. He has researched the story behind a memorial in Gilling West Church to Christopher Cradock from Hartforth Hall: 'The North Riding's Forgotten Admiral'.

The hall is now a hotel but retains its family links through a painting of Christopher's last command, The Good Hope, his ill fated ship at the battle of Coronel.

Born in 1862, Christopher was a younger son with few expectations. Consequently, after a brief education at Richmond Grammar school, he joined the Navy aged only twelve. Two years later he was a midshipman and then steadily rose through the ranks to Rear Admiral.

His career took him around most of the world, gathering commendations and medals on the way for his bravery in the Sudan and during the Boxer Rebellion in China in 1900. Closer to

home he served on the royal yachts and was appointed ADC to Edward VII.

In his spare time he wrote books including 'Whispers from the Fleet' - essential reading for any young man contemplating a naval career. Rather alarmingly in retrospect he admitted that he had little experience of gunnery and had asked someone else to write the relevant section.

The Great War found Cradock at the other side of the Atlantic. Sam filled in the background of many of the personalities involved in directing the actions of the navy at the time, particularly the First Sea Lord, Winston Churchill. Much of the advice coming from the Admiralty was open to more than one interpretation and the only way ships could receive their orders was to put into port and collect telegrams - not exactly instantaneous.

Christopher Cradock's final engagement was the Battle of Coronel, fought off the coast of Chile in November 1914 when he was outnumbered and outgunned. Possibly he should have withdrawn but he was determined not to back down and risk court martial as had already happened to one of his colleagues in the Mediterranean fleet.

In total 1570 men were lost from the British fleet and two cruisers were sunk, whereas the Germans suffered only three wounded. Inevitably the blame for the humiliation focussed on Cradock for engaging the enemy odds aaainst such and recommended a good book on the subject, 'Scapegoat' by Steven R Dunn - the title says it all.

### **Autumn Term School Report**

The Autumn term was certainly an action packed one for us at Reeth and Gunnerside Schools. We returned to school in September to benefit from further enhancements to the learning environments: both the infant classroom and the central iunior classroom at Reeth had refurbished and decorated - the 'new look' rooms have a light and airy feel, with improved furniture layouts and wall display areas.

We have also re-developed the west facing classroom at Gunnerside as a Year 5/6 classroom, enabling the pupils on that site to benefit from 3 modern classrooms and smaller class sizes. In addition, we have upgraded our IT resources at both sites, replacing the older desktop PCs we had with new, high specification education laptops - 15 at each school, complimented by our class set of iPads.

We launched our updated curriculum, working on a two year cycle, and have seen some brilliant learning experiences as part of this. Our Year 3 and 4 class have learned about the Vikings and have brought the project to

life by building a longship in the field at Gunnerside. Working with Forest Schools practitioner, Mr Pellatt, the pupils have learned to use tools and natural materials found within the school grounds. The results were fantastic and pupils have commented on how it felt like they were making a real boat, ready to sail.

All junior pupils took part in a fantastic cultural visit to York in November. Year 3 and 4 experienced archaeological discovery at DIG and the Jorvik Viking Centre, while Year 5 and 6 focused on Roman history at York Minster. We stayed overnight at the youth hostel, visited York Mosque on our second day and had a great time experiencing a contrasting locality.

We have also contributed to an exciting project, working with BBC Radio 3 and children's author, David Almond, making a programme about Crackpot Hall and about the story of a small girl called Alice who was said to live there in the 1930s and to roam around alone. The BBC and David had tracked down Alice, finding her well and now living in Carlisle.

Keen to find out more about Upper Swaledale and children's perception of this landscape today, David led a discussion with junior pupils followed by

# Reeth Parish Council November 30

Youth work: Richie Bastow, local Youth Development Worker, attended the meeting to explain about his role in supporting community volunteers to set up clubs and activity groups for young people across the area. An advert would be placed in the Gazette to encourage volunteers to come forward and there would be consultation with the young people to find out what, if anything, was required.

Road works: No further information had been received about time scale of the road repairs between Strands and Gunnerside.

Flash flooding: The county council had been in touch regarding planning to deal with flash flooding. The clerk would inform them that any such emergency would be more than adequately handled by the local fire service.

**Donations:** Donations would be given to Reeth Brass Band towards the purchase of new uniform jackets for those moving up from the junior to senior band; and to the *Great North Air Ambulance*.

**Planning consent:** There were no objections to an application for a variation of the planning conditions at Orton Works.

**Street lights:** A street light pole which had been damaged in recent gales had been replaced and other similar poles had been inspected. A number of others around the village which were not currently working would be reported.

**Precept:** It was agreed not to set a precept again for the coming year as

income from the market and honesty boxes covered the foreseeable expenditure.

Christmas: The new Christmas tree lights had been delivered and the tree would be put up in early December. Carols round the tree with the brass band was confirmed for 8.00pm on Sunday, December 20 and Coun Beal would approach one of the local businesses to ask if they would consider providing light refreshments on the night.

**Parking:** Coun Kendall would discuss with the GP the wording of a notice to be displayed in the surgery about parking in Langhorne Drive.

Problems were still occurring on the narrow road at the top of the green where wagons were driving onto the grass to avoid parked cars damaging particularly it, in wet weather. Similar damage had been caused Sauare. in Anvil discussion amongst councillors and with residents it was agreed to initially try a combination of yellow lines and grasscrete to protect the affected area of the areen.

Remembrance Sunday: The arrangements had gone well. It was agreed that next year's tea would be moved back to the Memorial Hall which had been unavailable this year due to a prior booking.

### Yorkshire's National Parks Join Forces For Celestial Celebration

The Yorkshire Dales and North York Moors National Park Authorities are teaming up to hold their first joint week-long Dark Skies Festival during next February's half-term school holiday.

The Festival, which will take place from Monday 15 February until Sunday 21 February, will invite visitors to eye the skies and discover the wonder of stargazing in the two Yorkshire National Parks. The low light pollution in both Parks makes them an ideal location for spotting constellations, shooting stars and other cosmic happenings.

Together with sky-at-night events, visitors will also be able to discover more of the nocturnal world within the National Parks with guided torchlight walks highlighting the wildlife activity at night.

The programme of activities includes a host of other events such as a dark sky trail run, evening caving, storytelling, glow-in-the-dark writing, poetry readings, solar system scavenger hunt, telescope-making and craft activities throughout the week.

The main events will be held in and around the National Park Centres in Reeth, Aysgarth Falls and Danby, and Sutton Bank and Hawes, both of which are also designated Dark Sky Discovery sites, with skies that have been found to be sufficiently dark that the Milky Way can be seen to the naked eye.

Dalby Forest, another Milky Way class Dark Sky Discovery site in the North York Moors will also be involved,

as well as events held in conjunction with Hidden Horizons on the coast.

Both National Parks are working with groups such as the Reeth Informal Astronomy Group and Whitby & District Astronomical Society to stage the Festival.

Businesses and attractions in the National Parks are also being encouraged to participate by organising their own dark skies event, making it a celestial celebration right across the Dales and North York Moors from the Pennines to the coast.

Richard Darn, astronomer and dark skies hunter, commented: "Yorkshire is fortunate to have some very special spots in both National Parks which are a stargazer's paradise. In an urban area you will be lucky to see 20 stars on a clear night whereas in an area of low light pollution such as the National Parks you could see as many as 2,000.

"We will glimpse the great winter constellations of Orion and Gemini as they give way to the sparkling spring stars of Leo. We'll also have a stunning view of Jupiter and a waxing moon. It's a fabulous time to celebrate this amazing Universe and our wonderful dark parks."
