First Thoughts . . .

Did you and another person ever get your heads knocked together at school? There was no thought of it potentially causing a mild concussion - it was done purely for the purpose of 'knocking some sense into you.'

Other forms of punishments were also available: A teacher clutching onto one of your sideboards (Or do you call them sideburns?) and raising you up so you were standing on tiptoes, while he admonished you for some minor misdemeanour. Or if it was a more serious offence, then obviously the cane, or, as was the case with a Scottish priest who taught us, a leather tawse. (We used to call him Father Jock Strap.)

To make the cane more demeaning, you would be sent to the staff room to collect the weapon of offence; and then have to stand in front of the class while the punishment was administered. There was some debate amongst us pupils as to the best way to hold your hand out: should you stretch your fingers out to present a harder surface; or relax your hand to soften the blow? I don't think we ever came to a definitive answer.

In my early days as a teacher, the woodwork teacher would punish pupils by making them hold a block of wood in their mouth. The wood was suspended from the ceiling at such a height that they had to stand on their tiptoes. The metalwork teacher simply told pupils that they had to produce one ounce of iron filings for him and provided them with a file and a lump of iron. Unless they had been given it before, they thought it a soft punishment. It wasn't.

Try it yourself.

Some punishments were warranted, albeit somewhat cruel; others were completely unjustified. But did we complain to our parents? Not on your life - we would have got clouted again as we obviously 'deserved it.'

What has started off this train of thought? Well I have just been listening to a news report about the Brexit debate, which no doubt will still be going on when this edition comes out. When I listen to the so-called debating that is going on in the House of Commons, I can't help but think that their level of debate is little better than children sguabbling the in playground. Which made me wish that we could get the politicians from both sides of the divide . . . and knock their heads together


Reserves Policy

The Board considers that it should maintain reserves to cover the production of four issues of the Gazette. This figure to assume that there is no income from advertising either because there is no advertising or that the advertisements have not been paid for causing a cash-flow problem.

The reserve required is therefore $\pounds 5,200$. Reserves are currently double this amount.

Action

Dales Police Report


The following incidents of note have occurred in the Dales area recently:

Overnight on 28th November a Landrover Discovery parked near Gunnerside was damaged in an unsuccessful attempt to break into it.

Sometime around 2nd December a yellow 250CC Yamaha trials motorbike was stolen from a secure garage in Reeth

On 6th December a quantity of cannabis was seized by police at an address in Middleham. The female occupant has been dealt with for possession of Class B controlled drugs. Please contact the police if you have suspicions of drug use in your area.

In the early hours of 12th December an occupied house was burgled on Harmby Road at Leyburn.



The thieves took a purse, champagne and a Zoostorm computer. This is an unusual and infrequent offence in the Dales, so don't have nightmares. Please take a few minutes to check your home security.

On the evening of 23rd December two unidentified males entered a farmyard near Spennithorne and threw rocks through the windscreen of a farm vehicle. They were seen to leave in a red Audi car.

Two incidents of sheep worrying by out of control dogs have occurred in Middleham and Hawes over the Christmas period. A number of sheep were killed and injured. Two dogs were also shot. This is hugely upsetting for all involved. It is preventable. Please be aware of what dogs (descended from wolves) are capable of if not properly controlled.

Finally, as well as dealing with the usual array of road traffic collisions, health incidents domestic mental disputes, missing persons, assaults, thefts, safeguarding concerns, sudden deaths, poachers, and more, your Dales Neighbourhood Police Team has also taken part in a number of local initiatives. These have included plain clothed shoplifter operations, licenced premises checks with a drugs search dog, monitoring green lanes for off road vehicle misuse, drop in surgeries, and the Christmas drink drive campaign. We also greatly value the support given by mobile rural watch and front counter volunteers.

Remember, we rely on you to call us if something looks suspicious or out of place.

Message From The Swaledale Museum

February is the time to catch up with all that reading and research that has accumulated. One of the books that is on our pile to tackle is Sweet Slices of History - Baking and Cakes (published by Prospect Books, 2018), a vividly told story of the creation of sweet dishes from historical recipes by Marjory Szurko, who is the retired Librarian of Oriel College Oxford.

Now I hear you mutter, 'What has this to do with Swaledale?' Well, Chapter 7 looks at the Otterington Hall Recipe Book in the Oriel Collection. It contains recipes gathered by Lady Eleanor Furness in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. She moved to Otterington Hall near Northallerton in 1914 after the death of her husband, and her descendants bequeathed the book to Oriel in 1974.

One of the recipes was contributed by Mrs Dora Elizabeth Spiers, wife of Dr WC Spiers of Reeth. It is for Yeast Cake, and requires flour, baking soda, sugar, mixed peel, sultanas, yeast, eggs, butter, nutmeg and milk. Has anyone made this? Marjory Szurko has, because the book is based on her 'Edible Exhibitions' she staged at Oriel, where all the exhibits were consumed.

There are also recipes given by Mrs Gregory, Lady Eleanor's sister, and wife of the Rev. Bertram Gregory, vicar of St Andrew's in Grinton from 1907 until his retirement. So this explains the connection with Swaledale. We assisted Marjory with her researches, and she has generously donated a copy of the book to the Museum. She hopes to be in Reeth in July, and we are hoping to

stage a miniature 'Edible Exhibition' to celebrate the book. Watch out for this event on our website.

Barbara Buckingham has sent us several local recipes, do you have any? We have a couple of recipe books in our collection, hand written and some cut out from newspapers and pasted in. If you can help us, we might have enough material to stage a display. We could make some of them up to welcome Marjory to Swaledale.

Don't forget that we are now closed for the season, and will re-open in the Spring. You can of course still contact us, see the details below.

October's speaker was Jennifer Deadman who talked about her work as a surveyor of historic buildings and the importance of accurately observing and recording what is still visible before the remains are lost forever. She began with some fascinating records made in the 18th and 19th centuries by travellers such as Daniel Defoe and the engraver Thomas Bewick which showed typical pastoral scenes of the time, including very basic dwellings and people going about their daily work. Other important sources of contemporary information were old maps which showed how settlements had changed over the years, with some shrinking from a hamlet to a single

Illustrating her talk with pictures of recent projects with which she has involved in Nidderdale and been Teesdale Jennifer had manv photographs of buildings which. externally at least, show little signs of their former use. At a farm on the A66 for example, a room above the stables had been used to house farm labourers who had left their mark in graffiti on the walls, recording everything from the dates of ploughing and sowing to a drawing of a football match. All this is now lost as the buildings have been converted to another use.

A cluster of farm buildings in New Forest, south of Barningham were all that remained of the settlement of Hallgate where the last inhabited house had been abandoned in the late 20th century. Searching trade directories and census records had enabled Jennifer to trace its gradual decline over the decades and to learn about the families who had lived there and to identify which houses they had lived in, as well as the acreage farmed. Surveying the properties inside had revealed details of daily life and showed how the houses and farm buildings had been altered over the years according to need and financial means. On many farms in the area the presence of a domestic fireplace in a cowshed for example reveals the position of the original farmhouse in amongst the barns and byres while its 19th century replacement is situated away from the mud and muck of the working yards. A fine example of this was at Naby in Teesdale which had been rebuilt as part of Monsignor Thomas Witham's rebuilding and improvement of the Lartington estate.

The Heroes of Telemark

You may have seen the film - it has been on TV once or twice - based on a raid on a 'heavy water' plant on the Telemark Plateau in southern Norway in 1943, but an obituary in The Daily Telegraph newspaper last year revealed an interesting fact about the operation

The obituary was for Joachim Ronnenberg who, at the age of 23 was chosen to lead the raid which was intended to thwart Nazi Germany's attempt to create a nuclear bomb. The raid was a spectacular success - some say one of the most important acts of sabotage of the Second World War. And it was completed without firing a shot - despite what you see in the film version which Ronnenberg dismissed as 'hopeless'.

What the article revealed however, is that the raid was officially known Operation Gunnerside as the head of the Special Operations Executive, Sir Charles Hambro, used to come up here with his family to shoot grouse.

Planning applications: A letter would be sent to the planning authority expressing the council's disappointment at the refusal of planning permission for Shoemaker Barn and asking for feedback on the reasons behind the decision.

Highways and Police: Considerable concern was expressed over the lack of response to questions raised when July Richard Marr attended the meeting to discuss various problems including road repairs and safety, in spite of follow up enquiries from the clerk and District Coun Blows. Coun Barker reported that since the initial meeting another car had come off the road in icy conditions on the corner where there was no barrier and he felt strongly that the Highways department were not taking the council's concerns seriously. In addition Coun Barker felt that it was very disappointing that there had been no follow up from the meeting between three council members and the Police and Crime Commissioner who had agreed to look into many of the same issues.

Beckside saplings: A site meeting had been held to look at the problem of the overgrown saplings on village green near the river bank and a quote obtained for clearing them. It was hoped to cover this cost from an environmental grant or possibly to have the work carried out by volunteers.

Parish hall: The building would be inspected to ascertain the amount of repair work required and a grant would

be applied for.

Fireworks: A number of concerns had been raised about very loud, nondomestic fireworks which had been let off in the village on New Year's Eve.

Next meeting: 7.15pm on Monday, March 4th, in the parish hall.





Less Is More In The Garden

Landscape architect and garden historian Marilyn Elm explores the origin of the Modernist style of garden design in a talk for The Arts Society Wensleydale on Tuesday 12th February at 2.00pm in the Middleham Key Centre.

The approach emerged in Europe and the USA in the 1920s based on both developments in Fine Art and the Bauhaus design principle of integrating form with function. This rejected the idea of decoration and emphasised the amalgamation of house and garden as a single living space. Gardens echoed the geometric forms of the house, while plantina was economical and low maintenance with an emphasis on grasses, plants specimen and contrasting materials.

In the UK, Gertrude Jekyll's partnership with architect Edwin Lutyens resulted in the Arts and Crafts movement remaining a strong tradition in the relationship of house to garden. Some Modernist designs appeared in the 1930s but it was the 1951 Festival of Britain that heralded its emergence.

This talk explores the catalysts for the Modernist style that has found expression in garden making ever since.

For one month only, The Starman has travelled south to appear in The Upper Wensleydale Newsletter; and in return, their astral expert, Al Bireo, has ventured north for our edification.

This month's full moon on February 19 is the biggest and brightest of the year - a so-called Supermoon. It should appear almost 8% larger and about 16% brighter than your average full moon when it rises in the north-east around 5.30 in the evening (GMT) - quite a spectacle. Supermoons aren't particularly rare but there won't be another as good as this one until December 2024 so let's hope those clouds stay well away.

The last half of February also provides your best chance of the year to glimpse the innermost planet, tiny Mercury. Not many people can claim to have seen this elusive little world so why not have a go at spotting it for yourself. Look low in the south-west about 40 minutes after sunset from the middle of the month onwards. Its golden-pink dot should be easily visible to the naked-eye particularly when it's at its brightest between February 25 and March 2.

If you can brave the cold, frosty February provides some of the best starry skies of the year - and you won't have to stay out all that late to enjoy the view. Soon after dark the grandest of all the constellations, Orion (the Mighty Hunter of the old Greek myths) marches high in the south accompanied by his faithful hound, Sirius the Dog

Star. Sirius is by far the brightest star in the sky and can't be missed, flashing like a great diamond low over the horizon.

Orion's bold rectangular outline with a distinctive sloping line of three stars forming his 'Belt' and the Red Giant star Betelgeuse marking his left shoulder, is very easy to recognise. Just below the middle Belt star you'll find his sword, home to one the most famous objects in the night sky - the Great Orion Nebula, a vast cloud of interstellar gas and dust many light years across. It's just a misty patch to the naked-eye but a really spectacular sight when photographed with a large telescope. (See photograph on the next page)

Over in the north-east of the sky you'll see the familiar shape of the Plough or Big Dipper, standing on its handle. Its seven stars form part of a much bigger constellation, Ursa Major, the Greater Bear, the third largest in the sky. The Lesser Bear, Ursa Minor, home to Polaris, the Pole Star lies not too far away roughly halfway up the northern sky. The brilliant yellow star high overhead is Capella, the 'little shegoat' in the constellation of Auriga the Charioteer. See if you can spot the 'Kids' a pair of much fainter stars slightly to the west. Lower in the north -west, beyond Polaris, is the squashed W shape of Cassiopeia, the Lady in the Chair. The Winter Milky Way flows past Cassiopeia on its way to the northern horizon. A glorious sight on a dark, moonless night

Towards the end of February the winter star groups begin to drift noticeably westwards making way for some of the early springtime stars -



Leo the Lion, Virgo the Virgin, and the Herdsman, Bootes. Bootes main star is golden Arcturus, the fourth brightest star in the sky. You'll find it low in the east-north-east around 10.00pm. If you're not a fan of the cold, cheer up to seasoned observers, Arcturus' reappearance is a sure sign that winter is finally drawing to a close and that spring, at long last, is just around the corner Have clear skies

Middleham And The Dales Local History Group

The Wensleydale Dairy Days Project is the subject of a talk by Dr Karen Griffiths at Middleham Key Centre on Tuesday, 19th February at 2.00pm.

Soloists who performed on the night were Andy Nicholson (Flugel Horn), Dave Hodgson (Euphonium) and Nigel Robertshaw (Post Horn). Nigel also sang a Christmas folk song, accompanied by the band, which gained rapturous applause.

Sunday 16th found us on the platform of Richmond Station, playing to the customers in the restaurant below from 10am to 12noon. The same soloists performed to a large audience. It is always a pleasure to play at the Station as the acoustics are exceptionally good.

The band's annual Christmas concert was held in the Reeth Memorial Hall on Saturday 22nd at 7.30pm. This was well attended with a large appreciative audience who were treated to a wide variety of Christmas music from popular to traditional tunes, with light refreshments to follow at half time. The raffle and donations on the night raised over £300 for band funds. Before the concert concluded a bugle, which originally belonged to Mr. James (Jimmy) Allinson, who was the father of our late President David

It was my privilege and honour to return the bugle to Jimmy's grandson Andrew Guy, a member of Muker Silver Band. This was especially poignant as we commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the end of WW1. The bugle is inscribed "Presented to the Swaledale Branch of the Royal British Leaion James Allinson esa." bv Unfortunatelv date shown no is although it is known that this would be after WW2

When the Swaledale Branch of the Royal British Legion ceased to function, the bugle was handed to the band for safekeeping. It was given to a band member James (Korky) Kendall to play



on Armistice Day in St. Andrew's Church, Grinton. James played it for many years during his 60+ years with the band. When James sadly passed away, the instrument was handed back to the band by his wife Jennifer for safekeeping. There is no firm evidence at this time to confirm that the bugle was played by Jimmy during WW1, but from its condition and age it could well have been.

On 23rd the band played for the annual carol service at St. Mary's Church, Arkengarthdale at 6.30pm. The service was tinged with some sadness because there was no choir for the first time in many years. School children from Arkengarthdale Church of England Primary School performed a number of songs beautifully. This may also be for the last time, as the school is destined to close, after existing for 360 years. An unfortunate sign of the times we live in here in the dales. I fear for the future of the band, and intend to work with anyone who can help to preserve our 160 year heritage.

During the month there were a number of engagements, performed in various locations by small bands, ending with the traditional playing of carols around the village on Christmas Day. This signals the end of our year performing for many different events in 2018. We look forward to entertaining you again in 2019.
