JUMANJI (Welcome to the Jungle)



Those of a certain age will remember the great Robin Williams bursting forth from the original board game followed by herds of wild animals which rampaged through the city streets, courtesy of what was then cutting edge CGI.

Now considered somewhat of a classic, the good folk at Sony pictures decided that over two decades later a 'reimagining' was well overdue, and so we find ourselves back in the game, though this time naturally a video game where characters choose avatars (imaginary characters) to do their 'gaming' for them. The clever new trick here is that when four diverse High School friends tinker with the game they find whilst tidying a storeroom in detention, they literally are sucked ('Pleasantville' style) and find that their 'avatar' players bear no resemblance to their real characters. Whilst the first film concentrated on 'playing' the game and bringing Mr Williams back to the real world, here we have the spoilt blonde turning into 'middle aged fat man' (her words) Jack Black, the nerdy boy into 'The Rock', the quiet and shy girl into all action Lara Croft clone Ka-

ren Gillan (Amy Pond from Dr Who) and the sporty jock into a short and timid scientist. The rest of the plot is pretty much by numbers as our intrepid foursome encounter all manner of outlandish perils as they trek through their Junale, from heavily armed 'poacher' types to hungry hippos. Two clever plot devices keep the interest throughout - each character it is discovered early on have only three 'lives' to add to their jeopardy, and they also meet a further character in the game who it seems has been in there for twenty years - a plot device neatly set up in the proloque section. All four protagonists learn valuable life lessons as their alter egos, and, in addition to some startling action scenes and beautifully choreographed martial arts, there is (family friendly) broad humour at the expense of gender -swapping. The Farmers Daughter (1947)



Quite an obscure classic from 1947 starring Loretta Young (see 'Bishops Wife') -this time paired with the ever dependable Orson Welles favourite Joseph Cotton ('Citizen Kane', 'Magnificent Ambersons' etc). If the recent election didn't tire you of US politics completely, then this good natured romantic drama will charm you with it's homespun philosophy mixed with political intrique.

Simple but headstrong farm girl (Young) heads for a nursing job in the big city but is waylaid by a scallywag and ends up having to recoup her 'nursing money' by working for the family of a late respected senator. Son of the family (Cotton) is running for senate but soon becomes beguiled with the outspoken (but wise) new maid.

His Mother, played by the great Ethel Barrymore, is the first to spot this burgeoning romance, but as 'Katy' continues to 'improve' the household and is taken under the wing of head 'butler' Charles Bickford, it transpires she has an astute political mind - even

if her politics are opposed to that of her new 'family'.

It is no surprise that the young homespun 'Katie' soon takes a commanding lead in the polls, but just as all seems plain sailing, the aforementioned scallywag resurfaces to 'smear' her reputation (falsely of course) and her public support crumbles. Previously we have met Katie's three strapping brothers (two played by 'Marshall Matt Dillon' James Arness and 'Tarzan' Lex Barker). and they are now recruited to help sort out the mess, resulting in an all-out climactic punch-up at a remote cabin where the miscreant and his minders are holed up. Of course, all's well that ends well and Katie wins her seat once the subterfuge is revealed.

Amongst the gentle drama are some stand-out comedy scenes including some skating on thin ice (literally) and the lunatic fringes of a political rally ('Fish for sale'!). Acting is superlative throughout and although the big fight scene may not measure up to today's visceral scraps, it is in most ways a faultless film of it's genre and period

Community Bus February

The HUB at Hudson House, Reeth is continuing to provide support and information through these dark days. We recently had a review meeting as we have just entered Lockdown 3 as I type this and through this meeting we are making the following changes to the service. But I do stress we are here for you, so just call us on 880021 to see how we can help. There is a 24 hour answering machine, so please leave a message for us to get back to you. We are carrying out temperature and oxygen level tests on the volunteers 3 times a week. We will be taking stricter measures all round, this includes the Community Bus and who can travel on her, only a specified number of distanced critical volunteers carrying out shopping for the community can travel with us until further notice. The only exception we can make is to transport people to their vaccination.

Hudson House is closed to the public, please do not enter the building unless you have a pre-booked library appointment and then only visit the library area, do not enter the rest of the building. We need to keep this area safe for the volunteers.

Shopping will now go down to one day per week to minimise the risk to the Critical volunteers that are carrying out these duties to support the community. The one day will be Wednesday, we will then review at the end of the month. The prescription delivery service will remain unchanged.

If anyone wants to join the weekly shopping buddy scheme please contact us. If this sounds daunting, it's not. We have a brilliant volunteer group and we

can pair you up with one, until you feel confident to fly solo. Occasionally, we have more shopping than usual to do, sometimes due to people shielding again, or monthly shoppers. If we could call on you less regularly, for an extra pair of hands, please contact us. Transport, masks and gloves can be provided.

In summary, it's not all doom and gloom, we are here and we are all happy to carry on regardless to keep our community safe until we can all mingle again. In the meantime we are here for you, even if you just want a chat with someone. Stay safe, sane, keep smiling and it will always be alright in the end and if it's not alright, then it's not the end!

Message from the Swaledale Museum Reeth

Heartiest good wishes to you all for 2021. We are very much looking forward to programming our events and getting back into our stride, so keep an eye on our website for the latest news.

Thank you for all your kind comments on the latest edition of the Friends of the Museum Newsletter circulated in early December. Tracy Little our fabulous editor is now gathering material for the Spring edition.

Thank you Gary Woodward for contacting us about last month's mystery photograph capturing, as he correctly noted, the erection of what we now know as the Memorial Hall in Reeth. It began life as the Conservative or Constitutional Club. We still don't know what Casebourne's Cement is. We also wonder who 'R.Pedley' noted on the photograph was. We know that Edward Pedley (1881-1954) from Grinton, the son of a local lead miner, and a selfemployed stone mason and later a builder and contractor built the east wing of Hill House (now the Burgoyne Hotel). I had incorrectly assumed that it was Edward Pedley who was involved in building of the Constitutional Club. In 1944 fund raising was afoot to purchase the Hall for the community.

We have a programme for a 'Grand Concert' dated 29 January 1944 which raised nearly £30 towards this. According to the national historical currency convertor this sum represented 21 days pay for a skilled tradesman. Plus we must also remember that Britain was still at war. It was a good augury for the success of the fund raising

scheme. Do you remember what you could buy for that sum at the time?

A news cutting from the <u>D&S Times</u> reported that those who performed 'represented various denominations and different political opinions' including Mrs. Tyreman, Mr. Cuthbert Croft, Miss Eleanor Cleminson, Miss Sheila Spence, Mr. E.W. Dinsdale, Mr. R. Cherry, Mr. J.F. Kendall and Mr. J Allinson. A men's chorus gave a localised version of 'Widdicombe Fair', I wonder if anyone has the words?

Now for the January photograph. Where was it taken, and why are all the characters gathered there? Does anyone recognise any of the people? We welcome your comments and contributions.

Dark Sky Reserve Success for **National Parks**

The Yorkshire Dales and North York Moors National Parks have been designated International Dark Sky Reserves, joining an exclusive global family of Dark Sky Places.

The Yorkshire Dales and North York Moors are home to some of the darkest skies in the country, with large areas of unpolluted night sky where it's possible to see thousands of stars, the Milky Yorkshire Dales National Park know Way, meteors and even the Northern Lights.

As part of a coordinated approach by the two National Parks, the International Dark-Sky Association (IDA), has granted Reserve status to both areas. which combined cover over 3500 km² of northern England. This is by far the work with local authorities, businesses biggest such announcement in the UK and communities to ensure our dark and represents one of the largest areas skies are protected. in Europe to be simultaneously designated.

Both National Parks have worked hard over several years to achieve this award, gaining support from councils, parishes, landowners, businesses and renowned astronomical experts.

Moors National Park Authority said:

"'It's a wonderful thing to see a meteorite streak across the night sky. or to look up and appreciate the brilliance of the Milky Way. As a child I took these sights for granted, but now it's absolutely something we need to protect for generations to come.

"This designation as an International Dark Sky Reserve is the culmination of immense dedication and teamwork, and it will continue as we encourage more people to think carefully about our night time environment. From helping nocturnal wildlife to providing a boost for off-season tourism, the North York Moors looks set to have a better, darker future "

Neil Heseltine, Chair of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority said:

"Those lucky enough to live in the what it is to experience the wonder of some of the darkest skies in the country, and it's thrilling that the Dales has received recognition for one of it's most special qualities.

"Designation provides a fantastic opportunity to encourage tourism in the autumn and winter months, and to

As well as enhancing habitats for wildlife, improving health and wellbeing and bringing increased economic benefit to the local tourist industry.

The ambition is to enhance the area's dark skies still further by promoting the importance of dark sky-friendly lighting, therefore reducing unnecessary consumption of electricity and minimising carbon footprints and energy costs for households. Mark Sadler



Every household will soon be asked to take part in the 2021 National Census which is scheduled to take place on Sunday 21st March. The Office for National Statistics have said that this time they hope that most people will complete the questionnaire online, but they want to reassure everyone who does not have access to a computer or a mobile phone signal that they will still be able to get a paper copy of the form that can be completed in the traditional way.

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that records all the people and households living in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of the War year 1941.

Every household should receive a letter in early March that will include a unique access code to use if you can complete the form online. But the letter will also include details of how to request a paper or large print version of the questionnaire, together with details of who you can contact locally if you need help or support when completing it.

Dales Police Report December 2020

The following incidents of note have occurred in the Dales area -

Overnight 16th to 17th November a plant storage yard near Appersett was broken into through secure fencing. Once inside the offenders broke into a cabin and storage container. Nothing was believed stolen. On the same night a unit on the Upper Wensleydale Business Park was broken into by the external aluminium sheeting being peeled back. Not gaining entry by this method, the offenders then forced up the roller shutter door. Again nothing was stolen. Three individuals from the Durham area have since been arrested and are currently under investigation.

On the afternoon of 17th November staff at Leyburn Co-op noticed a suspected shoplifter in the store with a quantity of alcohol. When challenged he made off without the stolen goods, then driving off at speed in a nearby vehicle, almost running over a member of police staff in the process. Later enquiries led to a male and female from the Cleveland area being arrested. Charges have since been brought against the male for three counts of shoplifting and assaulting an emergency worker. Good job by shop staff keeping vigilant and quickly calling the police.

On the evening of 24th November a white Ford Transit van attached to a trailer bearing a mini-digger was reported abandoned on Hargill Road at

Askrigg. On police arrival it was soon apparent that the van was on false number plates and the mini-digger likely stolen. Enquires with Durham Police linked a further suspect vehicle possible associated with the abandoned van. Police cameras soon located this vehicle on the move in the Dales, and it was intercepted at Catterick by traffic officers. The 3 occupants, from the Cleveland area, were all arrested on suspicion of theft. The mini-digger was later found to have been stolen from a storage vard near Appersett. further male handed himself into police the following week. The investigation continuing. Anyone with information please contact 101 quoting reference 12200208670. Thank you to members of the Upper Wensleydale Watch who turned out to assist on the night.

Overnight 8th to 9th December a cattle trailer was stolen from a field at Preston Under Scar. It was located abandoned a few miles away on the road near Aysgarth the next morning.

As ever, although crime is down this year in Richmondshire, we must not be complacent. Have a look at your own possessions and check how easy they would be to steal. Consider CCTV, motion sensor lights, alarms and strong padlocks. Also, if you see something suspicious please call it in to police at the time.

As ever - wash your hands regularly, keep socially distant and wear a mask.

Bigger Ambition for Woodland in National Park

Bainbridge, 15 December 2020

Farmers in the Dales will be able to take advantage of increasing opportunities to plant and manage woodland during the next ten years, helping to maintain the viability of their farm businesses, this afternoon's online public meeting of the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority heard.

Members of the Authority voted to adopt a new ten-year 'Dales Woodland Strategy', the second of it's kind. The strategy has been devised by the Dales Woodland Forum, a partnership of landowners, charities and public bodies such as the Forestry Commission.

It sets an ambition to enhance the landscape by creating 6,000 ha of woodland habitat in the Yorkshire Dales National Park by 2030. That would take the area of the National Park covered by woodland, which is currently smaller than London (4.5%) and the smallest of any of England's National Parks, from 4.3% now to 7%.

It was confirmed at the meeting that the ambition in the first Dales Woodland Strategy 1995-2020, to plant 2,000 hectares of new woodland, had been met.

Member Champion for the Natural Environment at the Yorkshire Dales Nation-

al Park Authority, and member of the Dales Woodland Forum, Ian McPherson, said: "We have agreed that the open, farmed character of the Yorkshire Dales must be conserved. That's why the new Dales Woodland Strategy clearly sets out that any new woodland must enhance the landscape. The new ambitions represent a significant scaling up of woodland creation and management in the National Park, but we are all clear that trees must be planted in the right place and for the right reasons. For example, we must ensure tree planting doesn't adversely affect habitat used by birds of conservation concern such as the curlew.

"The new strategy acknowledges the role that existing conifer plantations play within the Dales and careful management of them will be key to survival of the native red squirrel. Creating further conifer plantations could be possible but only when they provide tangible benefits to the natural beauty, wildlife, and cultural heritage of the National Park.

I would like people to share my enthusiasm about the prospect of more trees in the National Park. New woodland is beautiful. It attracts wildlife. The good news is that public money is available for it. Trees sequester carbon and can help with water quality, natural flood management and, crucially, farm business viability.

Managing existing woodlands will become an equal priority to creating more woodlands. Existing mature field trees, usually marking boundaries, are

hugely important in the landscape, as are existing hedgerows, such a feature in the Cumbrian part of the National Park.

"Our starting point will be to work with people to expand or connect existing native woodlands. If we can do this and improve public access to woodlands, so much the better."

It's a positive step forward and one which was enthusiastically received by the full membership of the National Park Authority and our partners on the Steering Group".



I am trying to locate my primary school teacher, Mrs. Mary Hutchinson. She relocated to Swaledale around 1996 with her husband Jeremy to take up a post teaching at the village school. Dales Police Report January 2021

The following incidents of note have occurred in the Dales area -

damaged by someone jumping or sitting on the bonnet. If you witness any form of suspicious or anti-social behaviour please call it into police at the time.



No further expenses are expected until January 2023. The council agreed to fund batteries and pads for the Low Row defibrillator

Swaledale Night Sky

The constellation of Orion dominates the winter night sky. Readily identified about a third the way up the sky towards the south by the distinctive row of 3 close bright stars making up Orion's Belt. Most can see 3 'stars' hanging below the middle of the Belt - Orion's Sword, and if you have decent eyesight the middle part of the sword looks a bit fuzzy, though most stars can look a bit fuzzy to me nowadays! This is the Great Orion Nebula - birthplace of stars and solar systems formed within huge clouds of dust and gas that collapse under the force of aravity.





The image of the nebula was taken through a telescope from Swaledale just before Xmas. It shows gas and dust clouds glowing from the energy of newly formed stars. The Yorkshire Dales National Park is holding their annual Dark Skies Festival between 12th and 28th February. Owing to the current lockdown restrictions this will be entirely virtual this year. Events will be conducted via Facebook and 700m and can he found online www.darkskiesnationalparks.org.uk Keep an eye out for 'Swaledale Starscapes' - beautiful images of the Yorkshire Dales dark sky environment. All taken around Swaledale - celebrating the night sky, nocturnal wildlife, industrial heritage and the Dales at night.'

Teens go the extra mile for Mental Health Awareness

Darlington Mind encourages young people to get active for their mental and physical health.



In January, Darlington Mind, local mental health charity, will start their brand-new initiative called Lose The Blues. Lose The Blues is a project which encourages young people to walk or run regularly throughout January, to improve both their physical health and their mental health, as well as raising awareness for mental well-being. Darlington Mind are offering this

project because January can be a very gloomy month for many, so they're looking to put positivity back into that month, one step at a time. It's part of their young person project, called **DeCaf**, which is an activity club for young people, which has the emphasis on being a safe space where they are able to discuss their mental health issues. **Lose The Blues** is not just limited to young people though, it's accessible and open to everyone. Any person can sign-up, especially if it means supporting someone in your bubble.

After each excursion, or after each week, you can send us your total accrued miles and they get added to the database. Obviously, the benefits are all internal, so there is no need for a competitive element but there will be a soft counter to see how much a certain group or school can achieve as a collective. It's meant to inspire other people to take it up and feel the effects of going outside, embracing nature and to get the endorphins rushing with exercise. Due to lockdown restrictions, it's impossible to meet-up as groups, so there are online forums in which people can post their regular updates. There is a growing community feeling with this project, where each run/walk feels like you're supporting each other to carry on.

Darlington Mind are not doing this alone, as they have the help from many local organisations. How can being married or in a civil partnership save you money?

Two days before Ken Dodd's death the comedian married long-term partner Anne Jones, with whom he had shared his Liverpool home for the past 40 years. While the couple were reportedly delighted to have finally tied the knot, the action also avoided a potential inheritance tax bill of up to $\pounds 2.6m$.

Getting married these days is becoming less fashionable. In some cases, people who get together after a divorce are less inclined to tie the knot again, once bitten twice shy perhaps. Some people consider marriage old fashioned or as a patriarchal institution. Some people just don't get round to it.

However, unmarried couples are at a distinct disadvantage in some areas of taxation, of particular concern is Inheritance Tax (IHT). This is a tax on the money and assets that you leave to your partner, relatives and friends.

Inheritance tax rate is 40%, a substantial part of your assets. However, each person has an allowance of £325,000 before any tax is paid. This is known as the nil rate band (NRB). So, if you leave £500,000 in your Will the estate could pay (£500,000 - £325,000) = £175,000 * 40% = £70,000 tax.

So how can being married or in a civil partnership help?

Firstly, there is no IHT when you leave the estate to your spouse or civil partner. It is completely free of tax. When the second partner then dies the estate will usually be left to the children in which case IHT is due. However, the second reason to be married is that any unused NRB from the first spouse/civil partner to die is transferrable to the second to die. So the latter gets a double whammy of £650,000 NRB. In the example above of a £500,000 estate, no tax would be paid as the NRB is greater than the estate.

It gets better. There is also a Residential Nil Rate Band. If your home is gifted to your children there is an additional £175,000 nil rate band which is also transferrable from your spouse/civil partner.

So, in total, when the second of the married/civil partnership couple dies and then leaves the estate to, say, the children there is a total of £650,000 + £350,000 = £1 million allowance before any tax is paid.


Note that this only works for people who are married or in a civil partnership! A couple I know who both had had previous marriages had lived together for 20 years. They had been talking of getting married for quite some time but had not got round to it. Sadly, one of the couple died a month before their wedding day. He left her an estate worth £450,000. He only had his NRB of £325,000 and so the estate paid £50,000 in tax which could have been saved if they had legalised the relationship.





What's this 5G then?

This can be answered in so many ways. Here are some aspects of many.

In 2019, 5G, the 5th generation of mobile wireless networks (including compatible devices) began to be commercially sold. Providers guaranteeing a vast improvement over the capabilities of 2G, 3G, 4G and Wi-Fi.

Those improvements being:

Lower latency - optimized computer networking to process a high volume of data communications with minimal delay. The objective being to achieve real—time, no delay communications between any devices on the network e.g. automated cars communicating with other cars and traffic lights.

Private licensed radio band (spectrum) availability – organisations can purchase their own dedicated network radio bands.

Increased Data throughput

- Connections Capacity literally 1000's of devices connected to the network in a very small area.
- Reliability
- Security
- Area Coverage

Consumers

The general public will focus on how 56 can improve what they do now and what 56 will introduce. Whereas organisations will be interested in whether 56 increases profits and aligns with their strategy.

Data Throughput

Theoretically 5G is capable of max

speed of 10Gbp/s, whereas 4G is capable of 100Mbps. Therefore, theoretically over 4G, a 750GB HD movie should download in 100 minutes, whereas over 5G the same movie should download in 1 minute, 100 x times faster.

56 uses higher frequency millimetre wave bands than 46 to carry data. Unfortunately, although data throughput is faster, higher frequencies cannot travel as far as 46. Meaning more mini antennae are required to provide expected coverage for mobile consumers.

Health concerns have been raised to the extent that conspiracy theorists have blamed 5G for Covid, damaging antennae and insulting engineers. Research has proven that the wavelength of 5G radio waves does not breakdown DNA molecules. But the propagation of the 5G waves caused by electronic and magnetic fields (electromagnetic radiation) oscillating around each other, can warm up those same molecules. The same way in which microwave appliances heat up food. The effect of this warming is inconclusive.

Therefore, research cannot 100% confirm that there are no health risks. Although the results of studies from the World Health Organisation so far suggest that 5G is not harmful if the exposure to the 5G electromagnetic waves is low level. Lower levels occurring if that exposure is a distance from broadcasting antennae and/or for a very short period of time. The uncertainty of the risks of exposure closer to that antenna has resulted in them being protected by secure fencing.

Applications enabled by 5G Smart Factory Machinery such as shopfloor autonomous guided vehicles (AVG) which transport materials, are now capable of avoiding collisions because they can be managed via the fast exchange of real-time data communicating with their controlling servers.

Smart Factory Digital Twin. An example being the virtual digital representation of a shopfloor (generated using shopfloor located 3D Scanners, sensors and lidar measuring by laser light) enabling manufacturers to model shopfloor scenarios without any real-world physical changes. They can model operational changes, movement of equipment, increases in the number of AVG's to see the effect on production.

Smart Factory Augmented Reality. AR has been used in remote surgery, where in China, a doctor in one city successfully remotely inserted a device into the brain of a patient, who was in another city,1,900 miles away. Now possible because 5G introduced reduced video feed lag.

5G UK Coverage

Many Gazette readers will immediately ask will 5G provide complete coverage wherever you are in the UK, including for those who live in the many remote hidden away farms and cottages.

In this respect what are we to believe given the history of promises when other mobile phone communications technologies were introduced. Some of us probably still reply on plastic cups with string between.

30th November 2020 saw the 'take-it-with-a-pinch-of-salt' UK Government intention statements presented to Parliament by Rt Hon Oliver Dow-

den (secretary of State for Digital Culture).

Not much was promised in terms of coverage for rural areas. As per the GOV.UK web site, the text that refers to UK coverage talks about 'the majority' not the entire population:

'Significant economic and social value can be gained from the widespread deployment of 5G networks. These networks will deliver faster, more reliable and flexible networks that have the potential to transform key sectors across the economy. That is why the widespread availability of both 5G, and gigabit capable networks is a priority for this government. 5G is already available in over 100 towns and cities across the UK and the next few years will see increased investment in these networks as we deliver against our targets for the majority of the population to have 5G coverage by 2027."

So, who knows what will happen and 2027 an unimaginable date given the rate of technological changes we have experienced in 2020?

I would not recommend anybody spending extra for phones that are 5G compatible now, unless you are one of the increasing people who do not mind spending a monthly mortgage payment on your phone rentals.

Personally, I cannot afford such extravagance or maybe I am 'Yorkshire Tight' and it could be the fact despite working in IT since 1983 I despise mobile phones.






