

The Low Row Phoenix!

After far too long in the doldrums, the Low Row & Feetham Literary Institute's future is starting to look a lot brighter! In the last year, a lot of work has gone on behind the scenes into looking at what Parishioners see for the future of this valuable and underused village asset. Following on from the AGM last year, when the new committee was elected to oversee the running of the hall, the decision was taken to finally grab the bull by the horns and to set firm plans in place for the total renovation of the Institute. A flver was delivered to all the properties in the parish and many emails crossed the ether in order to find out just what people thought about their village hall and what they wanted see the Institute utilised for The Committee was left in no doubt that there was indeed a future for the Low Row Institute, and that it was close to being now or never to begin the project to update and protect the buildina. future of the Grant applications were made to several organisations and local government bodies, and thanks to the generosity and valuable time of others, the renovation project will start in the Spring of 2023. Funds are now in place to begin the first phase of renovations with the replacement of the doors and windows with more energy efficient units at the beginning of March. This will be followed, during summer, by the removal and renovation of the roof. which will be fully lined and insulated at this time. Other works, which

include the installation of energy efficient lighting and alterations to the heating system, are also scheduled to take place in advance of Phase 2 works. This will greatly reduce the carbon footprint of the building bring down heating costs and make for a much warmer and more welcoming building for people and groups to use. Fund raising is currently underway for Phase 2 of the renovation, which will include the insulation, dry lining and decoration of the hall's internal walls. There are several more phases of works to be funded, which will include new washrooms and toilets, purposebuilt storage for user equipment, full redecoration of all rooms, equipment purchases etc. etc.

It is a tall order and all this will need to be completed before the building is fit for purpose in the 21st Century. Yet a solid start has already been made. Apart from Grant applications, a 'Friends of Low Row Institute' group has been formed, their purpose being to assist in general fund-raising by helping to organise a program of events throughout the year. Their efforts will not only raise funds for the work but will help to revitalise the building and encourage people to meet, greet, entertain each other, and fully utilise the building as a community asset. An architect and contractors are currently being consulted and the disabled access/egress issues will also finally be addressed. We will issue further updates as work progresses so watch this space and rest assured that in the meantime, much is going on behind the scenes

Swift, Swallow and House Martin counters needed!

Wing It! The project giving a helping hand to the swifts, swallows and house martins of Swaledale & Arkengarthdale.



The days are getting longer and it will only be a few more weeks before the swallows, house martins and swifts of summer return to our dales to claim their nest sites

and breed. These special birds need you! Read on to find out how you can help them by recording what you see.

For the last two seasons we have asked you to record sightings of these species to help us make a map of where they nest. We used this information to decide where to put up nest boxes, choosing sites in areas that are already popular hotspots to act as nesting hubs. By the time the birds return this spring we will have completed our second winter of nest box installations, all based on the data collected

With our project gaining momentum, it's now more important than ever for us to work out where our swifts, swallows and house martins are nesting and how they are using the sites we have created for them to measure the success of our efforts and guide our future installations.

We also want to find out how they are using our landscape by noting where

they are foraging, and what habitats are important to them.

We are therefore appealing for volunteers to get involved with the following:

- Adopt a local patch, village or street and keep an eye on it throughout the summer to find out what is nesting where.
- Visit known nest sites and some sites we have installed over the last 2 years to check if they are being used.
- Count the number of birds using and foraging over a specific patch on a regular basis.

With a network of volunteers spread across both Swaledale and Arkengarthdale, we can learn a little more about how the birds use the two dales as a whole.

You don't need to know lots about birds to help- being keen is what matters! We will be holding some informal sessions (late March) to make



sure everyone knows what we want them to count and how to do it.

If Trees Could Talk...

1 - A Woodland History of Swaledale

Trees are silent partners in the long history of Swaledale and Arkengarthdale. They played a major role in creating our soils, fuelled our early smelt mills and provided timber for the lead mines that followed.

The location of most of our villages can be traced back to forest clearings and until cheap coal became available, local woods and hedgerows warmed the homes within them.


It's generally accepted that Swaledale and Arkengarthdale have more trees today than in their recent past. This is borne out by old photos, some a hundred years old or more, which show a landscape that is more open, or more bare (or both), depending on your point of view.



The photo above (late 19^{th} C) shows Isles Cottages in the centre-ground with what was then the eastern edge of Rowleth Wood just visible on the far left. The patches shaded green show the current extent of woodland, bearing out the accepted wisdom.

Old photos are very evocative, conjuring up images of lost tradition, although in fact they capture only a

single moment in time. An 1836 Act of Parliament required a very detailed set of tithe maps to be compiled (for land taxes) which have areas of woodland marked on them. The yellow shading on the old photo shows the extent of Rowleth Wood represented on the Melbecks tithe map.



Plenty of old photos show rather less variation over time than this one, but there are enough old maps and old photos to convince us that there was never a time when Swaledale's woodlands stood still for long.

Photos and maps take us back so far, but we have sources going far deeper into the past. Documents record the location, size, structure and use of woodland reaching as far back as the Middle Ages, as does evidence from existing ancient trees. Archaeology, pollen analysis and carbon dating reveal pre-historic evidence.

This article is the first of a set of seven that attempt to present a short history of Swaledale and Arkengarthdale's woodland since the last Ice Age, continuing on page 50 with 'the wild wood'

Neck and neck at 3-3, the game against Consett went to sudden-death penalties. It was a very close call but Ellen not only scored the fifth penalty but then put her gloves back on, returned to the goal to make the match-winning save to put the Quakers through 5:4 on penalties to the semi-finals of the County FA Women's Cup.



Manager Shaun MacKenzie said: "Ellen volunteered to take a penalty -- we know she can put them away as she does that in training. She was going to be in the first five, but we decided to put her sixth just in case -- and that's how it worked out."

Headgirl Ellen started playing football for a mixed team for the Two Dales

Football Club in Reeth when she started school, playing in matches Richmondshire across Wensleydale. She left the club to join Bedale Bluebirds, the girls' team at Bedale Football Club, when she was 13 and played in a local league in North Yorkshire for their U13 to U16 teams. After playing for Darlington Spraire FC's Under 18 team, Ellen moved to Darlington Quakers Α team September 2021 as their reserve goalkeeper, becoming their goalkeeper in September 2022. The team plays in the Durham Ladies League and recently competed in the Vitality FA cup, getting through the first three rounds.

Ellen is a keen athlete and demonstrates a huge passion and talent for football. After excelling in GCSE PE, Ellen opted to specialise in Sport

and is studying Triple CTEC Sport. She is highly regarded in school and college for her dedication to Sport and how she encourages and motivates her peers and younger students to take part in different physical activities and team sports. regularly leads at sporting events, including the primary transition visits such football and athletics.

Ellen said: "I have always enjoyed the thrill of being a goalkeeper and being under pressure in fact, I perform better under pressure! I have really enjoyed playing for all the teams over the years, and it's been privilege to be selected as Darlington Quakers' A-team's first goalkeeper. I sort of fell in to being a

goalkeeper, it was my first position when I was four playing at Reeth and I've stayed there ever since! I am intending to go to university to study Paramedic Science so I will be sad to leave the Quakers but I hope to join another squad at university."

Miss Abbey, Lead Teacher for PE, said: "Fllen outstanding is an goalkeeper! She has committed many years of training to develop her skills and work her way to first choice goalkeeper for Darlington. Saving a penalty and then turning around and scoring the winning penalty against another goalkeeper not only reflects her versatility as a player but also her mental strength to succeed under such pressure."



Reeth Station

Here are just some of the criteria you must meet to become a firefighter. You must have a C grade or equivalent GCSE Maths and English or take a test on both of these. You must have a good standard of eyesight and hearing, and be physically fit.

On a practical selection day, the following must be completed;

- 30 metre casualty drag with a 50kg dummy casualty
- Equipment carry, shuttle running a 25m course with various pieces of equipment
- Ladder climb and leg lock preparing to work from a ladder
- Ladder lift simulation 30kg up to chest height
- Enclosed space crawl with obscured mask
- Equipment assembly, accurate and quick assembly of a piece of mechanical equipment

Highways:

Engineers comments about the vegetation and wall by the beck from Muker bridge to the toilets; a full inspection will take place in the Summer of 2023 to assess works required. Cllrs welcomed any assessment and improvement of the wall and clearing of vegetation.

The **Highways** site visit took place with Steve Barker and Cllrs Peacock, Porter and Whitehead - a number of sites requiring attention by Highways were visited within the Parish for future attention.

Tan Hill Road at Pit Hill on the sharp bend and the Buttertubs bend: not considered because of cost and lack of reported incidents. Cllrs believed that was not acceptable and safety chevron warnings signs are required to alert drivers of the danger. Clerk to contact Highways.

Damage to 4 bridges in Swaledale. The bridges were damaged by an articulated lorry with a large plant vehicle as its load all around 4.40 to 4.45pm on Tuesday 13th December 2022: the bridges at Usha Gap, Scarr House and Thwaite were damaged. The incidents were reported to Highways Wednesday, α number on Parishioners witnessed the damage and the registration number NK17 LBY of the vehicle was taken. The incidents have also been reported to the Police Reference NYP-15122022-0169, some dash-cam footage is available

Councillor Calvert requested that Highways be contacted for additions to the signs for Silver Hill, where it has become increasingly common for Caravans and Camper Vans to ground their vehicles on the camber in the road and block it to traffic for considerable time. It is particularly prevalent during the summer months. Councillor Whitehead asked Highways be contacted to request that 30 mph signs be installed alongside the village name signs in Keld, as it was considered that 60mph is too high for this type of road

RICHMONDSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL

Funds allocated to community led housing scheme

A £570,000 project to create three more affordable homes in the village of Hudswell has received financial backing from district councillors.

Members of Richmondshire's Corporate Board agreed in January to allocate £325,000 of Section 106 money to the community led housing scheme. It will deliver three homes built in collaboration with Teesside University including a timber framed house that will adapt to people's needs as their life situation changes.

The Hudswell Community Charity - established in 2015 - has already delivered six homes for rent for people with a strong local connection. This new scheme adds another three to its portfolio.

"Hudswell is leading the way in developing affordable homes for local people. The charity is a driving force behind the success of its schemes," said Council Leader, Councillor Angie Dale.

"I am pleased that we are able to help them by allocating this money to allow the latest exciting scheme to reach fruition."

The District Council has also helped deliver ten units of affordable housing in West Witton and Bainbridge with grants totalling £422,250. Section 106 money is collected from housing developers to provide for delivery of affordable housing which is often hard to deliver in the more rural parts of the district.

New North Yorkshire Council launches on 1 April 2023

Priorities for the new council

A host of opportunities ranging from new jobs, combatting climate change, and introducing more affordable housing are among key priorities for a council that will launch in the spring to cover the whole of North Yorkshire.

The **new North Yorkshire Council**, which represents the biggest overhaul of local democracy in nearly 50 years, will provide a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to help tackle some of the biggest challenges facing communities across the county.

Among major issues outlined in a draft Council Plan for the new authority are a need to attract new businesses while developing traditional sectors, such as farming and tourism, and ensuring there are the best career opportunities available for young people so they continue to live in North Yorkshire.

The leader of North Yorkshire County Council, Cllr Carl Les, who will assume the leadership of the new authority from April 1, said: "This plan sets out our vision, ambitions and priorities for North Yorkshire and the approach we are taking to achieve them. We are committed to delivering high-performing and value-for-money services.

"We will encourage more involvement from local people and partners by championing local action and creating opportunities for local communities to come together to identify solutions and develop their own priorities."

Serving its customers

One of the biggest themes for the new council will be how it will serve communities to deliver services ranging from education and highways to waste collection and disposal, planning and economic development.

Residents will be given simpler and easier access to services which will be overseen by a single organisation, instead of the current structure of the county council and seven district and borough authorities. This means:

- a single website and phone number for communities to access support and services
- a main office is due to be retained in each area to provide public access to locally-based staff
- a network of local access points in towns and villages is also set to be established.

Scale of the new council's operations

The new council will be launched following the merger of the county council and the seven district and borough authorities to pave the way for a long-awaited devolution deal, with the Government due to hand decision-making powers and millions of pounds in funding to local political leaders.

However, Cllr Les acknowledged the immense financial pressures which the new council will face, with a shortfall of more than £30 million predicted for its first financial year alone.

The scale of the new council's operations will see it have an overall spend of about £1.4 billion, including £343 million on schools, and work will be undertaken on a major strategy to

balance the authority's books.

Improving public transport and increasing active travel such as walking and cycling will help to reduce carbon dioxide emissions which lead to climate change, along with increasing recycling rates and reducing the amount of waste sent to landfill. The new council aims to be carbon neutral by 2030.

The affordable homes crisis in North Yorkshire will be alleviated through major house-building projects to help to ensure that families and young people have the opportunity to buy their own homes.

Existing sectors such as farming and tourism will be supported, while skills are due to be developed for emerging industries including cyber, bio-economy and low-carbon jobs.

The draft plan includes details for safeguarding both vulnerable adults and children and ensuring the best possible opportunities for almost 83,000 children who attend schools and nurseries, including more than 11,000 pupils with special educational needs or disabilities

Talking Pictures

LIVING Review by John Hunter

With Bill Nighy nominated for an Oscar for this in the awards ceremony this month, here is John's review of the film, which we didn't have room to

publish when it came out last November. Ed

Surely heading for an award or two, here is a beautifully crafted film about dying...called 'Livina'. Forsakina the widescreen CG and of bombastic scores many current hits 'Living' begins with some charming 'cine' style colour footage of early 1950's London - shot in 'academy' ratio of course (a squarer frame - like old TVs) and surprisingly the whole movie is shown

in this earlier format which itself creates a retro feel throughout. The story dates from a Russian novella of 1886, but it is really developed from the 1952 Japanese film 'Ikiru' directed by the great Kurosawa (Seven Samurai etc) - with a little nod to that classic Alec Guiness film 'Last Holiday' (1950) written by J B Priestley. Both stories depict a character who finds he has merely months to live and facing the quandary of what to do with the little time left. Common to both again is the drum. almost meaningless hum existence they seemed to have lived, but whereas Alec Guiness invents a new

persona and 'lives life to the full' initially, Mr Williams here, played beautifully throughout of course by Bill Nighy tries a night of debauchery at the seaside accompanied by a bohemian author he meets but, unfulfilled, he eventually drifts back to his office and galvanizes his staid team into one last triumph - the development of an East End playground which has been sent back

to the 'in' tray for many months.

The story itself slight, but milking it for every cent it is worth are a cast of recognisable Brits at the top of their game, led by Nighy, who reigns in some of his more regular 'ticks' and gives a subtle, moving and memorable turn as 'Mr Zombie' as his young co-worker has nicknamed him. This character (an office junior) is charmingly

played by Aimee Lou Wood with a keen eye for 1950's demeanour. Theirs is a totally platonic relationship of course, but tongues still wag even in Mr Williams' own house.

The strained relationship with his son and the wonderful depiction of the buttoned up workplace of the day really hits a nerve, particularly in a scene later in the film when his principal four colleagues begin to unravel the man whilst travelling to work. One feels in the past they may never have spoken at all!

There is some dazzling cinematography by James Ramsey,



with period style compositions befitting the smaller format, and some clever sound mixing throughout in how some 'long shot' conversational scenes the score almost drowns out the 'idle' chatter so we feel we are interloping by listening Credit too to composer Emile Leviannaise-Farouch whose original piano led music ranges from Lisztian to Nyman-esque tonal uncertainty. The use of some 'easy listening' tracks of the time throughout is a masterstroke (I spotted Ted Heath's big band and some Bobby Darin).

Accolades to all involved! - Whilst a few more chuckles *may* have been woven into the dialogue, you can't fail to be moved by the marvellous writing and acting throughout. Don't miss it.





If Trees Could Talk... 2 - The Wild Wood (20,000 to 7,000 years ago)

Ground zero. Twenty thousand years ago, there were no trees in Swaledale or Arkengarthdale. No grass or moorland. No sheep or cattle or people. If you were unlikely enough to find yourself where any of our villages sit now, you would find it a cold, dark and airless place, as you would be underneath hundreds of metres of ice. The last Ice Age, though waning, was in full control.

Fast forward thirteen thousand years. to a place on the high ground just south of Summer Lodge, between Swaledale and Wensleydale. Permanent ice is long gone, replaced first by tundra, then scrub, then trees. The first to come north were birch. juniper, aspen and pine. They were still here 7,000 years ago, although hazel was then dominant on this high ground. We know this from the remains of trees found beneath the peat at heights well above the current treeline. And we know it from pollen samples taken from this very spot: dated and analysed.



Kisden Side: Juniper

There's nothing particularly special about this site. Samples from across the northern uplands tells a similar story with local variation.



Kisden Falls: Birch, Hazel

Looking around from this high spot 7,000 years ago we see a varied landscape. Peat has just started to form in damper spots where mosses have taken hold, and the hazel cover, with its mix of trees and smaller scrub plants, is broken by patches of heath and outcrops of pine and birch.

Peering down into Swaledale below we see a mixed deciduous wooded landscape, dominated largely by oak but in some spots elm and (where drainage is poor) alder and willow. There are fewer clearings down in the dale.

This is the wild wood. Coast to coast, Britain is covered by woodland. But it's not a continuous, densely packed, 'closed canopy'. It's a patchwork of trees and open spaces not unlike our

classic conception of parkland. Large herbivores are roaming, notably auroch and red deer. They not only need open spaces with heath or grasses to graze, they create and maintain them by nibbling down young trees. Beavers are architects of open water spaces. And traces of charcoal suggest that fire, some natural, some set by people, maintains cleanings and triggers the onset of peat formation.

Humans migrated north as the ice retreated and since then the landscape has been shaped by people, though few in number at this early time. Stone age people hunted, and soon learnt that by burning the wildwood, they could create clearings where arazina animals would congregate: more clearings meant more animals to hunt. Many clearings were temporary, and the wood grew back. Hazel regenerates quickly, which may be why it came to dominate on the high ground favoured by hunters.

Modern tourists who come to the Dales for a 'nature fix' are often surprised to learn that the moors, meadows and woods are features of human intervention. They are even more surprised to learn how long ago the interplay between people and the Dales' environment began.

The wild wood was never really wild.
