



Summer Sunday Dalebus Services

The popular Sunday DalesBus alreadv services are runnina Swaledale for the summer season, continuing Sunday until every 20th October, providing lots opportunities to visit different parts beautiful Yorkshire Dales of the National Park.

As usual. Northern DalesBus 831 runs Swaledale from Richmond (departing at 1040) via Grinton. Reeth (1105), Low Row, Gunnerside and (1132).and Muker crosses spectacular Buttertubs Pass to Hawes. home to the Dales Countryside Museum and Wensleydale Creamery. After a short break, there's an opportunity to catch DalesBus 832 to Ribblehead, Ingleton or Kirkby Lonsdale.

The return bus leaves Kirkby Lonsdale at 1530 arriving back in Hawes at 1625. The bus continues from Hawes at 1640 for the return journey on Northern DalesBus 831 arriving in Muker at 1702, Reeth at 1730 and Richmond around 1800. These buses also run on Bank Holiday Mondays.

Following many requests Northern DalesBus 830 returns this year, providing

access from Upper Swaledale to Richmond on Summer Sundays. It runs from Ribblehead Station at 1045 (connecting with the train from Leeds), Hawes Market Place at 1105, Muker at 1132 and Reeth at 1200, returning from Richmond at 1645.

The current national fare cap on bus fares applies to all these services, so each single journey costs just £2 (£1 for under 19s).

These services are run by Arriva North East as part of the DalesBus network managed by Dales and Bowland Community Interest Company, with support from Friends of the Dales, Friends of the Settle Carlisle Line, the Jack Brunton Charitable Trust, North Yorkshire Council and the Settle Carlisle Railway Development Company. The Ice Cream Parlour Celebrates 25 Years

In April 1999 Peter and I were married. We were looking for a new business. The plan was that I would carry on teaching and Peter would run the business. I was keen on a place in the Orkney islands but the only properties that came up there were petrol stations!

Then we found Mavis Brown's White House Craft Shop in Reeth. We loved it - the village, the view, the pubs and the people.

It wasn't long before we had come up with the idea of an Ice Cream Parlour.

People tell us now that they thought it was a crazy idea and they thought we would only last a few months.

We took possession of the property in January 1999, married in April and spent our honeymoon decorating and running back and forth to B & Q.

We opened one sunny day in May. I can't remember the exact date. We were all spick and span, dressed in our best with crisp new aprons. We tried to scoop our

first ice cream and to our horror found that it was not as easy as we had imagined. We had a hasty practice and produced such messy ice creams that we shut up shop and took off for the day. We visited as many ice-cream outlets as possible and watched avidly as they skilfully scooped the soft stuff! After an evening of practising we tried again!

We have never looked back. One of the things Peter and I loved best about our new life was meeting such a host of interesting and different people. Ice cream appeals to everyone from all walks of life. Characters from every corner of Britain and indeed the world began to walk through our doors, and we have loved serving them and appreciating their differences. Some have become regulars; others have visited every year and we have made such lovely friends.

After a couple of years, we welcomed our first baby, Eva and three years later, Ralph. I reduced my teaching hours to mornings only. When we got busy in the afternoons I would pop the baby in the pram, run along the cobbles to send them

to sleep, and then grab my scoop. My poor children had terrible sleeping habits!

Scooping ice cream kept us busy, and we didn't have time for many family holidays. However Swaledale is such a beautiful place to live that we really didn't need holidays. We often cooked breakfast at the water splash and



enjoyed picnic teas in the Orchard.

The Swaledale festival brought talented musicians through our doors and Peter's guitar hanging on the wall provided opportunities for impromptu concerts. I particularly remember when three cellists walking the coast to coast stopped for an ice cream and spent the afternoon playing beautiful music in the sunshine outside the parlour.

Marrick Priory have always been great friends and we have regularly opened in the evenings for parties of children to enjoy an ice cream and play the puzzles and games. One school used to bring their musical instruments and the parlour would burst with the sound of enthusiastic if not tuneful trumpets, flutes and recorders! We have long suffering neighbours!

The Tour de France was a great occasion. There was such an exciting build up. We dressed the parlour up with bicycle wheels and bunting and called on all our lovely student work force to help. When the race came through, we locked up and ran to watch and I remember returning to see a wall of people turn from the road and head in our direction. We served into the evening when people came with beer glasses in hand.

I cannot believe how fast the years have flown by. When Peter passed away in September 2021, I wondered whether it was time to move on. However, it didn't take me long to realise that the Ice Cream Parlour and Reeth was the place where we had been our happiest and so I chose to stay.

I have made a few changes during the past two years. I often smile to myself when I think what Peter would say about my snazzy new till and my host of vintage teapots!

He was always a bit grumpy about serving teas and coffees, especially when someone might want a 'decaf cappuccino with oat milk!' 'You're in bloody Yorkshire now you know' he was once heard to say!

Our coffee continues to be popular and we are really enjoying serving the delicious cakes made by the talented bakers at the Angelshare bakery.

Many of our young student work force have grown up and moved on to successful jobs and new enthusiastic youngsters have replaced them. Maggie and Ann have joined our merry band of scoopers and help me so much in the smooth running of the parlour. We love to provide a place for people to meet up. The Craft Group and the Reeth Writers regularly meet at the parlour, and we have stayed open over the winter months and welcomed hardy locals looking for a treat and a friendly chat.

And so, 25 years have passed and I would very much like to say a heartfelt thankyou to all our lovely customers and friends who have supported us, made us smile and helped to make those years so very happy.

Farmers Arms Community Purchase Update

It's a crucial time for the Farmers Arms community purchase. By the time this article goes to press, we should know whether our grant application to the Community Ownership Fund has been successful and therefore whether we can go ahead.

Following a successful pledge exercise, when over 400 pledges were received, the community share offer was launched on the 25th April and is due to conclude on the 25th May. At the time of writing, we are well on our way to reaching our target.

At the same time the grant application for the Community Ownership Fund, made on the 8th April, is being considered by the government. Though we're in the dark about when to expect a decision, we think it will be towards the end of May.

On the assumption our application is accepted the next stage is the actual purchase of the Farmers Arms and the work needed to ensure everything is in place to allow us take over its operation, including finding and appointing an experienced, community minded, tenant. Though it might take time to find the right tenant, we intend to ensure that the pub will still be open, even if it means offering a limited service until the tenant is in place.

If our application is rejected, there may be a final opportunity to re-apply

in June, but this will depend on the reason for the rejection and the timing of the general election. The MCBS Management Committee will make a decision on the best way forward as soon as feasible.

Whichever way the decision goes, we'd like to thank everyone who has given their support over the last eight months, without which we would never have had this opportunity.

Fingers crossed!

The Parish Council's discussions regarding the proposal to move Senior Upper Dales school children to Kirkby Stephen from September 2025 was fully reported in the May 2024 issue of the Reeth Gazette. Ed.

In summary The Parish Council believe the policy proposal needs to carefully consider each area individually and exceptions in unique circumstances should be catered for by NYC using its discretionary powers. Safety and child well-being must be paramount and financial considerations by NYC should not be the primary concern. It was agreed that the Parish Council should communicate far and wide with Rt Hon Rishi Sunak MP and senior officials at NYC.

Transparency code and Gov.UK domain and email addresses. The Clerk informed the meeting that Government is trying to move Parish Councils to have their own website with a gov.uk domain and ultimately for Councillors and Clerks to have a Gov.UK email address; this is for security purposes. The Council is required to publish Agendas, Minutes and any Documents and anvthina connected to the function of the Council. A £100.00 grant is available

from the Government to assist with the purchase of a Gov.UK domain, however it is only available from a Government approved company, of which there are 250. The Clerk has sought quotes from 3 companies on the list with set up costs varying from £400 to £1000.00, add on costs from approx. £200.00 per year. The Parish Council is being moved into this consideration because NYC are ceasing to host Parish documents from 31st March 2025. At the previous meeting Councillor Metcalfe suggested that we contact Yorkshire Local Council's Association (YLCA) to see if they had any capability of hosting council documents. The Clerk has contacted YLCA. have who said they considering being able to documents for councils. One of the companies the Clerk has contacted are believed to engaged with YLCA to try and enable hosting. However, it is likely that a cost will be involved. The Councillors decided that it would be more beneficial financially for the Parish Council to wait until the YLCA proposals are known before committing to one of the approved companies. Anniversary Celebrations at Low Row

2024 is the 150th anniversary of the formation of the Low Row & Feetham Literary Institute, so the village is holding a celebration and historical exhibition over the weekend of 6/7th July. Everyone is welcome to come and enjoy tea and cake while looking around the historical artefacts that will be on display. The Institute will be open between 10am and 4pm both days.

The Darlington & Richmond Herald for 18th April 1874 reports that "about eight weeks ago, a reading room was formed at Low Row, by some young men, who were desirous of improving themselves, and of becoming better acquainted with the leading topics of the day. Having hired a cottage, they commenced with three or four daily and weekly papers, and a few books; and so successful has the undertaking been that already there are 65 members enrolled"

There was a trend towards Self Help and Adult Education in Victorian times, and so the Low Row community were maybe a little late off the mark in deciding they needed a Literary Institute and Reading Room. The first Literary Institute in the Dale is thought to have been opened in Keld in 1862, and the Institute in Muker dates from 1864, but the Rules for the Mechanic's Institute that was opened in Reeth date from 1878, so the date of 1874 for Low Row & Feetham Literary Institute sounds right. But it would be many years before the

community could raise sufficient funds to erect a building specifically for the purpose.

rented Reading Room. There were 34 subscribing members at the start of 1877, together with 11 further members who appear to have been in arrears. It is not clear which books and newspapers were provided at the Reading Room, but the Accounts show that £1-3s-1d was spent on newspapers in 1876.

There has been some debate about which cottage in the village was used as the original Reading Room, but it was later described as "an old miner's cottage", that was "small, dark, damp and draughty". The 1877 Accounts show that a half yearly rent of £1-2s-6d was being "paid to Mr Birkbeck", so it would appear that this was to rent the Reading Room cottage. From the census records it would seem that the rent went to John Clarkson Birkbeck, a "Solicitor and Landowner", who was living at Hazel Brow House in 1871 and 1881.

Other records show that the Birkbeck family owned at least 6 Dwelling Houses in the village. Raymond Alderson has the original 1877 Rate Book for Melbecks, and this shows that the only Birkbeck property that was rented at

that time was Ralph Bank. Sinker's local history research suggests that Ralph Bank has in fact been 1, 2 and 3 dwellings at different times in the past, so the Reading Room could have been just a small part of the old building when it was what we would now describe as a house in multiple occupation. Local memory suggests that there may once have been an external stairway to an upstairs room at Ralph Bank, so it is thought that that would be the most likely venue for the original Reading Room.

The original Institute also organised community social events with a "Festival" being held every Good Friday. The Darlington & Richmond Herald for 18th April 1874 reports that "On Good Friday they held their first annual Tea Festival and Concert in the large room kindly placed at their disposal by Mr. William Airey at Haverdale Mill" and that "upwards of 400 people partook of tea". The Concert in the evening commenced "with the large room being densely crowded with an admiring and well conducted company". The names of many of the musicians and singers that provided the entertainment are listed, and this first Festival raised a total of £11 towards the purchase of further books for the Institute Reading Room.

The Institute seems to have gone from strength to strength as the Richmond and Ripon Chronicle for 3rd April 1875 reported that the second Festival proceeded "in a highly satisfactory manner with not the

slightest disturbance having taken place in a gathering of nearly eight hundred individuals". The article goes on to say that "a clear balance of near £20" was made, and "it is hoped that the day is not far distant when a new Institute will be erected in Low Row".

In fact it took almost another 25 years before the village was able to open a purpose built Literary Institute and Reading Room.

A plot of pasture land at Pithell Hill was acquired by the community from Francis Horner Lyell [the lord of the Manor of Healaugh Old Land], and management trustees for the proposed new building were admitted to the Annual Court Baron and Customary Court of the Manor on 27th May 1907.

The community then launched an appeal for financial assistance to help fund the erection of "a building which shall serve as a Literary Institute" and to furnish it. The appeal document stated that "The Committee are delighted with the earnest interest shown by the people of the district, and especially with that of the young men, who are giving a great deal of time to the work which is preparatory to the actual building, and thus saving considerable expense".

The appeal also noted that "the people of this thinly populated neighbourhood are doing what they can towards this desirable object", and that the Committee would be very grateful for any financial help "seeing that this is an almost purely working class community, and that the sum required

Plants too are silent witnesses to crimes. Their presence in many crime scenes can help an

investigator identify a suspect or locate a victim. Apparently mundane plants such as brambles and nettles can provide valuable insights into when a crime was committed. Spring Covid-19 Vaccinations

The local NHS is encouraging eligible people to come forward before the end of June for the spring COVID-19 vaccination.

People at increased risk from severe illness can get the vaccine, including those aged 75 or over, people with a weakened immune system or who live in an older adult care home.

The virus can still cause serious illness and be life-threatening for some people. The vaccine provides protection against it and helps to reduce the risk of serious illness and hospitalisation.

Last year's spring vaccination programme showed that people who received a vaccine were around 50% less likely to be admitted to hospital with COVID-19 for three to four months after vaccination, compared to those who did not receive one.

Spring vaccinations will be available until 30 June 2024. Eligibility is similar to previous years, but those with a weakened immune system are now eligible from six months instead of five years.

Following advice from the Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI), this spring's eligible cohorts include:

- •Adults aged 75 years and over by 30 June 2024.
- Residents in care homes for older adults.
- •Individuals aged six months and over who are immunosuppressed.

Anyone who is eligible can book a vaccine appointment via the NHS website or by calling 119 for free. People aged 16 and over can also use the NHS App to book an appointment.

We collected tree seed and berries last Autumn from local ancient and semi natural woodlands and planted them into seed boxes built at a YDMT workshop. Once potted on, the saplings will be kept in a sheltered enclosure at Reeth Surgery in preparation for planting around the two dales over the winter



Miniature effects By John Hunter

Making small seem large....

Last time we had a brief look at 'Matte' paintings - how clever '2D' art could deceive your eye - so this time we'll go '3D' and check out the world of movie miniatures. Since the earliest days of the cinema, 'models' have been used instead of full sized objects for both practical and financial reasons. Crashing a plane into a cliff side or blowing up a mansion could only be done in miniature, and again some experts in the field made their name in the early days such as John P. Fulton and A. Arnold Gillespie who headed miniature departments which oversaw model sets, aircraft, ships (filmed in huge tanks) and vehicles. The Lydecker brothers began working at the 'cut price' Republic studio (home of many westerns and serials) and worked miracles with intricate miniatures almost always filmed outside, thereby creating a naturalistic lighting. In the 50s and 60s LB Abbott contributed to many big budget features like 'Tora Tora Tora' - yet another depiction of the Pearl Harbor attack (after 'From here to Eternity' and numerous others - the later epic 'Pearl Harbor' would still include miniature effects, but the computer was used for the 'money' shots.).

In the UK there were equally innovative effects technicians - in the 40's Percy 'poppa' Day created some amazing matte paintings to enhance miniature work in 'The Thief of Baghdad' and many other 'epics' - and in the 50s both Cliff Richardson and Les

Bowie. created some almost imperceptible model work (for the 'Hammer horrors' amongst others). Bowie's disciple Derek Meddings honed his craft in a string of Gerry Anderson 'puppet' shows (Thunderbirds being perhaps the most memorable) where he designed the crafts and sets and oversaw the complex wire work and miniature explosions, which became his trademark. No wonder then. progressed not only to the original 'Superman' but also those overblown 007 movies of the 1970s were he blew up miniature super tankers, villains' lairs and even a space station.

As with our previous matte article, a picture paints a thousand words, so I'll conclude with some visual examples;





Pictures 1 & 2 - a large miniature built high on scaffolding for 'The Ten Commandments' - in the final film (pic 2) it stands in the background, along with 'live' action in the foreground (both filmed outside in sunlight) - the

'background' model and foreground action are 'joined' by a matte painting to complete the full illusion.

In his book "Bloody Swaledale", "A cornucopia of dire deeds in the Dale from ancient times to the present day", Richard Hunt from Gunnerside corroborates Barbara's account, when he writes:

"The Burgoyne Hotel in Reeth was requisitioned and used as the Headquarters of the Reconnaissance Corps Battle School for the latter part of the war..".

Interestingly, Richard also has something to add concerning last month's query about **Operation Gunnerside:**

"Gunnerside was used as the code name for the operation leading to the sabotage of the German heavy water plant in Norway, carried out in order to delay the development of a German atomic bomb. The name was chosen by the head of the Special Operations Executive (SOE), who used to visit the village before the war for grouse shooting and the story of the raid itself was later made into a film as "The Heroes of Telemark" starring Kirk Douglas, Richard Harris and Michael Redgrave"

D Day Remembered

On the 6TH of June 80 years ago more than 130,000 Allied Troops landed on the beaches of Normandy, Amongst them were two Battalions of the Green Howards, the 6th & 7th Battalions who were amongst the first to land on Gold Beach. These battalions were part of the 50th Division which had been personally selected by General Montgomery as he wanted battle hardened men that he could rely on. Only one Victoria Cross was awarded on D Day and that was to Company Sergeant Major Stan Hollis of D Company 6th Battalion commendation states "displayed the utmost gallantry". By the end of the day The Green Howards had advanced 7 miles into occupied France further than any other Allied units. The Green Howards lost 180 men that day and they are remembered on a memorial in Crepon, France, which has the simple inscription:

"Remember the 6th June 1944."


